Church 'Friends' welcome Co-op project fund-raiser

Sedgefield's ancient church could soon become a warmer and more welcoming building, thanks to the local Co-op.

Friends of St Edmund's have welcomed news that their group is one of three local groups chosen to benefit from the store's latest Community Fund project - the other two being the Girl Guides and Sedgefield Primary School PTFA.

For the next six months, Co-op members can opt to give 1per cent of what they spend on Co-op branded goods to the new church heating system appeal. Local residents who are not already Co-op members can obtain the necessary blue card from the local store and then simply register it at *membership.coop.co.uk* Alison Hodgson, secretary of the Friends group, said this week: "We are delighted to have been chosen to benefit from the Co-op's project. A new heating system will be a great step forward as we progress towards making St Edmund's a true community hub." The Co-op has already given the Friends' appeal a major kick-start by donating a third share of all cash raised from the sale of its 5p carrier bags.

For the last 6 months the Co-op Community Fund has been collecting money for local projects and on 19 April Hayley the store manager and her colleague Judith handed over a total of £3,388, divided between Friends Of Sedgefield Harriers, Sedgefield Primary School PTFA and Sedgefield Community Association.

Sarah Guest thanked Hayley and her team on behalf of the SCA Committee saying that the funding would be used to help improve the environment at Ceddesfeld Hall with new furniture and refurbishment.

GP practice: Changes to Out of Hours Appointments

That was then ... prior to 1st April 2017, Skerne Medical Group offered urgent appointments to patients on Saturday mornings between 8am & 12noon, accessed either by telephoning 111 or 'walking into the surgery'.

This is now ... from 1st April 2017 and following a public consultation process, the Clinical Commissioning Group commissioned a new primary care service for patients requiring immediate medical care, outside of normal GP hours, through South Durham Health CIC.

This new service provides access to general medical services in a variety of locations across the area of Sedgefield and Easington between 6pm & 8pm Mon to Fri and on both Saturday and Sunday mornings from 8am to 1pm. Patients in need of immediate medical assistance outside of 'normal' GP hours (Mon-Fri 8am - 6pm) need to contact the NHS via 111, where staff will advise you of the location of the most appropriate service based on your need. *(See summary right.)*

This new service is not operated by Skerne Medical Group although our premises at Harbinson House, Sedgefield are being used by the staff who provide the service, for the convenience of patients living in Sedgefield and the surrounding area.

Steve's Nature Diary The natural world month by month: May

You may have read about various species that are increasing or decreasing and might wonder how we know this. Quite often it is due to an army of dedicated volunteers who spend some of their spare time surveying for particular species e.g. butterflies, bees, mammals, or birds. Local organisations like Tees Valley Wildlife Trust and Durham Wildlife Trust are always keen to receive records from members of the public or even better if you become one of these volunteers.

Last year 130 volunteers surveyed the rivers and becks of Durham and the Tees Valley looking for the distinctive signs of otter, footprints or spraint, or if very luck a glimpse of an otter disappearing under the water. They are also interested in hearing about your mink sightings - you may ask why?

Otters will eat a wide range of foods, given the opportunity, however they mainly eat fish. Mink, however, spread their diet much more widely, so while they do eat fish they also prey heavily on birds and small mammals. Unfortunately our native water vole is a favoured item on the mink menu and , as mink are smaller than otters, a female animal fits very snugly into a water vole burrow. This can result in the loss of an entire water vole colony from one predation event. The Trust urgently need to build a better picture of how widespread mink are in the North East, so it is important that all sightings are reported and recorded . So if you see a mink please let the Trust know – just some basic information such as date time and location.

But how can you get involved this year?

Durham Wildlife Trust are offering training to help people to learn how to survey. There are sessions on:

Emperor Moths using pheromone lures; Chalk Carpet Moths, a calcareous grassland species; White Letter-Hairstreak Butterflies, a woodland butterfly with a white letter W on the underwing, as well as looking for Dragonflies and Damselflies at Low Barnes. Details can be found on the new look

The British Trust for Ornithology each year organises several surveys, some of which the general public can get involved in. They use Birdtrack, an app to upload sightings, and for the second year running they are looking at House Martins.

We know surprisingly little about House Martins even though they breed alongside us, using our houses on which to build a nest made of hundreds of beakfuls of mud. We do not know why this species is in rapid decline in the UK. Currently, it is 'Amber listed' in the Birds of Conservation Concern listings, compiled by the UK's leading conservation agencies. The Nest Monitoring Studywill involve volunteers making regular observations at individual nests to collect information about nesting activity. This study will be ideal for observers who have nests on their home or place of work. For more information visit www.bto.org/volunteer-surveys/house-martin-survey



Spring judging

Northumbria in Bloom judges Robert Germany and Anthea Stephenson enjoyed their spring visit to Sedgefield on a sunny April morning. They were very impressed by the impeccable standard of the floral beds created by council gardeners Stephen Young and his new partner Ben Gray, who are also responsible for the colourful tubs of flowers in the village centre. The new self-watering tubs have proved a boon, boosting the impact of vibrant bedding plants.

The judges also admired colourful displays created in Ceddesfeld Gardens by the

volunteer Bloomers. Their major new project 'Stepping Through Time', has progressed dramatically since Robert's last visit two years ago. Victoria Conner, creator of the willow tunnels and creatures which have already proved so popular, joined the judges at the beginning of their walking tour.

Final turning and tidying will take place over the next few weeks, ahead of planting of new shrubs in May and June. Further plants, including ferns and woodland bulbs will be added later.

Judges visited the Manor House, where owner Ean Parsons and Sedgefield mayor Chris Lines both spoke highly of the impact and value of gardens created there by Bloom volunteers.

The judges also admired attractive planting along the church wall and Vicar's Dash, Crispin Court, Rectory Row and the mixed border at Wykes Close, where preparations are well under way for a wildflower meadow to bloom in the summer. Beyond the village centre, planting in the Turnpike Bed and the vintage seed drill were complemented by a fine array of daffodils and zingy scarlet tulips.

Sedgefield in Bloom publicity officer Norma Neal said, 'The judges had nothing but praise and positive comments as we toured the village. Everyone, from traders and residents to council gardeners and grass cutters had pulled together with the Bloomers to make a great impression on this first judging day.'

Thanks from SACT

Letter from PC Todd

Crimes reported this month include burglary, theft and criminal damage. In Eastwell Close, thieves removed the keys to two vehicles after they had forced entry to a property via the patio doors. Later one vehicle was found abandoned and the other burnt out. Hardwick Hall suffered from more lead being taken from the roof and at the Total Garage two males took confectionary whilst paying for fuel. Damage was reported to the bus shelter in Durham Road where the glass panel was kicked out. Damage was also reported in Kerr Crescent where a door bell was pulled off and in Rectory Row the bottom panel of a garden gate suffered damage.

On a good note, a shoplifter was handed an 8 week custodial sentence for shoplifting in the Co-op. The offender had only just been released after a prison term for similar offences.

Telephone Fraud:

Next, details of a disturbing recent case of attempted fraud to help prevent anyone else becoming a potential victim. Please be aware that phone

calls that are unexpected, apparently random and from people you have had no previous contact with, might be potentially dangerous to you. One such a call was made to a resident recently. The caller claimed that he represented an internet provider company and that they were phoning to repair the victim's internet and router. The caller then led the victim through a complicated series of questions and actions during which he informed the victim that she was entitled to £200 compensation as the problems she was having were their fault. At some point in that process the victim gave the caller her bank account details so that he could deposit the compensation in her account. After a pause to transfer the compensation to the victim's account, the caller informed the victim that he had pressed a wrong key and had accidentally transferred £4200 into her account. On checking her online banking, the victim found that a deposit of £4200 had indeed been made to her current account. The caller proceeded to tell the victim a sob story about how much trouble he would be in if he

couldn't get this money back and begged her to return it to him. He added that, as this whole mess was his fault, she need only return £3500 but that she would need to go to the post office to send the£3500 to SENEGAL by 'Moneygram'.

Fortunately, the vigilant post office staff were suspicious and the transfer of funds was not made. The victim, on checking her accounts more carefully discovered that the money that had appeared in her current account had been transferred from her own savings account by the fraudster once he had received her bank details. Please be careful and don't give anyone details of your account numbers and banking passwords. Reputable companies will never ask for these details over the phone (or in an email, for that matter) and so you can be quite sure that if anyone does ask for information like this they are up to no good!

Pub Watch: A meeting was held recently at the Golden Lion. No incidents were reported that required further action by members. *Until next time, Keith*

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel

The second Neighbourhood watch meeting of the year was held on Tuesday 11th April. PC Keith Todd provided details of crimes recorded in our locality between February 12th and April 11th 2017. These crimes comprised 4 thefts, 2 burglaries, 7 cases of anti-social behaviour, 4 of criminal damage, 1 robbery, 2 shoplifting incidents, an arson and a worrying case of attempted fraud; twenty two crimes in total.

The secretary circulated details, from Police UK public information, showing that the monthly average for crimes in the Sedgefield area for the full year ending January 2017 was almost 26. The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 13th June.

I am sure that most of us have contacted the GP surgery at some point needing an appointment and been frustrated that we have been unable to book one on a day and time that is convenient to us. Meanwhile at the GP surgery, the staff have to deal with the frustration of patients not turning up for appointments, sometimes even those who have been given an appointment that day for something 'urgent'. Nearly 3,500 appointments were wasted or lost last year by people just not turning up.

So to improve the situation for everyone, the Skerne Medical Group is reminding us all to **cancel appointments that are not required.** 3,500 appointments equates to 111 GP days. Just imagine the difference that all that extra GP time could make if it could be used for seeing and treating patients.

A Sedgefield winner in the VW Racing Cup

Father and son, Simon and Owen Walton had a weekend of mixed emotions in the opening round of the VW Racing Cup supporting the British GT. Driving for Swanflight the first racing took place at Oulton Park in a big grid of 27 cars. Driving a brand new pair of Audi TT's built from scratch over the winter, qualifying was tricky in the wet weather, as the drivers and cars have undergone very little wet weather testing. Owen managed to qualify 15th and Simon qualified 22nd.

With the track drying up but spots of rain still coming down and grey skies overhead looking to open any minute the team made a bold decision to use slick tyres in the hope that the circuit had a dry line and the rain would hold off for the 20min race. That gamble paid off with Owen fighting his way through the pack from 15th to 1st on lap 8, setting the fastest lap of the race and holding his position to come through the chequered flag as the winner. Simon also made good progress and managed to bring the car home in P14 making up 7 places.

Race 2 and a reverse grid put Owen in P6 and carrying the 40kg of championship ballast. Although he had a poor start he didn't lose any places, getting up to P5 and then holding P3 and P4 the full duration of the race. Then on the last lap, with two corners to go, disaster struck with Owen losing all brakes at Druids. The car went into

the barrier, over it and in to the trees.

Thankfully Owen is completely fine, walking away from the crash. However, the team will have a lot of work to do to get the car repaired to come back fighting for the next race at Rockingham on 30 April. Meanwhile Simon finished a respectable 10th and with his car in one piece.

This is a tricky month for compiling the sports update. It's not that there isn't plenty of news to report from Sedgefield – that's very rarely a problem! The snag is that some of it won't be happening until after the print deadline for Sedgefield News. Sedgefield District RUFC will have played their final fixture of the season just as I send this document to the editor, while various runners from Sedgefield will be making their final preparations for the London Marathon the following day. A few days after that, the annual Neptune Relays event will draw athletes from all around the North East to Hardwick Park, and then 27th and 28th April will see the finals nights of the Sedgefield Squash Club Championship for senior and junior players (if this does happen to appear through your letterbox in time, you are welcome to pop along to the club and watch the action).

So, there's an awful lot going on as always, but I can't yet share many of the details or results, because I don't have them (the notable exceptions are below). That's a shame, as they might provide a welcome distraction from the tail end of the football season for supporters of several of the North East's well known clubs...

Cycling

Talented young Sedgefield cyclist Ben Hetherington, pictured right, continues to make very encouraging progress in the sport. Aged 21, Ben is now a member of the Memil Pro Cycling team and rides regularly in races around the world. During April, he tackled the Tour de Maroc, a 10-stage race in Morocco that is part of the UCI's (Union Cycliste Internationale) Africa tour of events. The event involved 1500km of riding across the north part of the country and almost 40 hours on the bike. During the first four stages, Ben was a proactive rider, regularly getting involved in breaks from the main peloton. On the fifth day, Ben once again forced the pace and was part of a breakaway. At the foot of the stage's long and hard climb, he got away with five others and they worked well together. With 20km to go, Ben made a solo break and despite a headwind and the chasing bunch of sprinters, he managed to stay ahead and claim the stage win, the biggest victory of his career to date. Ben went on to finish 27th overall in the Tour de Maroc, a very impressive result at that level for a young rider. I will bring you more news as Ben continues to compete in road races this year.

Squash

The Sedgefield Squash Club season is drawing to a successful close. The senior teams have now completed their campaigns, with the men's first and second teams consolidating their respective positions in Divisions 1 and 2 of the county leagues. It was even better news for the men's third and fourth teams, who both secured promotion from their divisions - a great effort. The ladies' team narrowly missed out on a place in the final of the County Cup, and finished their league season in good form.
