Ball Game

Spring arrived in timely fashion for Sedgefield's Shrove Tuesday Ball Game this year, bringing with it a bright, cool and slightly breezy day. Anticipation grew as the appointed start time approached. Players gathered on the green and a growing crowd of onlookers watched from the relative safety of The Black Lion corner.

At one o'clock the ball was alleyed and the game was on. This year the task of starting the game fell to life-long Sedgefield resident, Geoff Wright. A source close to the organisers said Geoff was delighted to be honoured with this traditional role.

Just over three hours later the outcome of the game was decided, with Tom Adcock (pictured) emerging as this year's winner.

The Adcock family now joins the club of Sedgefield families who have had father and son winners of the game. Tom's dad, John, was the winner in 1974.



Stepping through time

Sedgefield in Bloom's 'Stepping Through Time' project in Ceddesfeld Gardens is beginning to take shape. To the left of the entrance gates, a large overgrown area has been cleared of ivy and self-seeded shrubs. Pruning some trees and removing others has opened up the area, allowing in more light. Our friends from Durham County Council and AW Tree Care have provided muscle and equipment to help the Bloomers out with this major task, and now we can see where we're going.

Victoria Conner of Willow Barn at Blakeston has been commissioned to provide a variety of structures, which will be installed soon. Bark chippings, recycled locally, will provide a robust and ecologically sound surface. The planting design will include shrubs, perennials, ferns and seasonal bulbs, selected for colour, variety, hardiness and attraction to pollinators. We are indebted to Andrew Jackson and his team at DCC for advice and support. After a lot of hard graft from Bloomers and friends, this long-term project is finally coming to fruition. Sedgefield Primary reaches for the Stars!

The children of Sedgefield Primary chose to have a Star Wars Day to celebrate the school's rankings in the DfE Performance Tables. The celebrations included a special Star Wars themed lunch, with a menu created by the members of the School's Nutrition Action Group (SNAG). Later in the day parents and carers were invited in to share the celebrations.

The school's attainment in the 2016 SATs placed them in the top 10 of County Durham Schools and the top 10 of their performance group nationally (based on prior attainment). In addition the progress made in reading, writing and maths from KS1 to KS2 placed them in the top 3% of schools in England. According to the DfE Performance Tables, "There is no better performing similar school in the group that is within 75 miles".

Headteacher, Andrea Cox, said, "We are very proud of all of our hard-working children and staff and feel that their achievements should be celebrated. We are also very grateful for the fantastic support provided by our parents and carers. The children in Year 6 last year were exceptional and were successful in so many ways. We are sure they are continuing to be super stars in Year 7."



Steve's Nature Diary

The natural world month by month: April

By the time you are reading this, spring will be well underway - chiff chaffs singing, blue tits taking up residence in bird boxes and the spring flowers blooming. It is time to get your cameras or mobile phones out and get snapping.

For the past 4 years, the three North East Wildlife Trusts (Northumberland, Durham and Tees Valley), the Natural History Society of Northumbria (NHSN), Great North Museum: Hancock and Alan Hewitt Photography have joined forces to organise the North East Wildlife Photography Competition supported by Nestlé Fawdon.

There are six competition categories to enter: wildlife portraits, wildlife in action, wildlife in the landscape, nature up close, young persons and mobile nature. There are prizes for each category both for the winner and runners-up. As in previous years an array of wonderful prizes is on offer, including a £250 voucher from London Camera Exchange (which has an outlet in Newcastle), binoculars, photography workshops, wildlife watching trips, bird watching workshops and photography equipment.

As well as a chance to win a fantastic prize the entries also help to showcase the wonderful wildlife that can be found in the North East. Entry is free and is open to everyone, but photographs must have been taken in the North East. Winning photos will be exhibited in the Great North Museum: Hancock and on tour around the region. It is a great opportunity to show the best of the region's wildlife.

Even a stroll round Hardwick Park with your mobile phone could give you several opportunities to take a whole range of photographs; the ducks on the lake, not just mallards but tufted duck, pochard and widgeon as well; on the boardwalk and bird tables with blue and great tits, nuthatch and you might even get a picture of a greater spotted woodpecker. If you put your mobile phone camera on the macro setting you can capture close ups of bees and butterflies visiting the flowers around the park – so get snapping.

The competition closing date is midnight Monday 15 May 2017, with the winners being announced by David Lindo (The Urban Birder) at an awards ceremony on Thursday 6 July at Great North Museum: Hancock.

Cycling in Sedgfield

The article (left) prompted us to think about cycling in and around Sedgfield. Whilst confident cyclists are happy to head out of the village to the coast or further afield to the dales, those who consider getting on a bike again after months or years may not realise that there are safe and traffic free routes right on our doorstep.

There are cycle routes in and around Winterton and a cycle route clearly marked around Hardwick Park; 2.3km (1.4 mile) long - a great way to enjoy the park. Reach it by cycling along Station Road, then turning down the old road to avoid cycling around the roundabout (it is signed). Also in Hardwick Park, Bike4Life delivers cycle rides suitable for beginner and intermediate cyclists. If you don't have a bike, they can loan you a bike and helmet free of charge for the duration of each session. To take part, simply turn up on Thursday at 9:30 (lasts up to 2 hours).

You can also cycle from the village along Beacon Lane and join the cycle route alongside the A689. From here you can ride safely away from the traffic to the Castle Eden Walkway, before choosing to cycle south to the visitor centre at Wynyard Woodlands Park or north to Hurworth Burn Reservoir.

For children who may like some coaching with British Cycling-qualified coaches, Stockton Wheelers run sessions at Middlesbrough Cycle Circuit. They also organise ladies only rides. Ferryhill Wheelers Cycling Club have members aged from 10 to 90, who participate in most cycling disciplines, including road racing, track racing and pottering around the lanes. The Club also organises the 10k time trial along the A689 starting in May.


For BMX, check out the North East BMX Club at Summerhill in Hartlepool.

Sedgefield Community College Official Opening

On 16th March, Sedgefield Community College was honoured to welcome His Royal Highness, The Duke of Gloucester to formally open the 'new' college buildings.



Whilst it is some time since the main college building opened in 2011, only recently has the campus has been completed. A 10 classroom annex has finally replaced dilapidated portable buildings that had remained in use as classrooms to meet demand for places. In recent years, student performance has been outstanding and for the last three consecutive years the school has been County Durham's highest attaining, recently featuring in the Sunday Times list of the UK's top 50 (11-16 schools) for the first time.

His Royal Highness took the opportunity to tour the buildings whilst speaking with a number of students and staff along the way. He observed work focusing upon the science behind crime scene investigations, the study of literature across commonwealth countries and activities designed to provide students with a greater understanding of Islam. The Duke also enjoyed a dance performance from students of all ages that will be performed at the Gala theatre in April. The visit concluded with Head boy and girl, Robbie Till and Eleanor James, presenting His Royal Highness with a contemporary art piece, created by students and inspired by the architecture of County Durham.

Sedgefield Village Action Group update and news

The new road through the approved Eden Drive development

SVAG met with Durham County Council officers to raise the community's concerns regarding the creation of a new road spur from the A177/A698 roundabout into the new Eden Drive development that received planning permission in 2016. DCC was represented by Stuart Timmiss (Planning), David Waffer (Traffic) and Ian Thompson (Regeneration and Local Services). SVAG was represented by Alan Paterson, Julia Bowles, Liz Mitchell & Julie Archer.

We expressed our concerns regarding safety for entry and access to the village off an already worrying roundabout, the creation of a potential 'rat run' through a housing estate dominated by family homes and queried the various rumours concerning the status of the existing Stockton Road.

It was a long and sometimes frustrating discussion. The following points summarise the outcomes:

- It was confirmed that Stockton Road will remain as it is, allowing both left and right exits from the village, and entry only from the west.
- The new road through the Eden Drive development will be the bus route instead of Stockton Road.
- SVAG and John Robinson argued the case for an additional roundabout at the Stockton Road exit, DCC did not agree and quoted the cost would be too much and the volume of traffic not heavy enough to justify the expense. David Waffer agreed to send information to SVAG/John Robinson regarding costs, which have since been received and quoted as approximately £2 million pounds.

Please let your Town Councillors and SVAG know your views on this road.

Letter from PC Todd

I am happy to report this month that the number of reported crimes has reduced from last month. These include a burglary at the Black Lion pub where CCTV recorded two males in balaclavas entering via the rear of the premises and attacking the gaming machines. Hardwick Hall suffered another attack on its roof during which a quantity of lead was stolen. Retail premises continue to suffer from shoplifting, the Co-op and Premier Store both reporting incidents. A house was damaged in Kerr Crescent after someone broke in and set fire to bedding/clothing in two rooms and in West End clothing/laptop were damaged in a domestic incident. Unusually, a drunk and disorderly female was arrested and issued with a £90 fixed penalty ticket as a result of her behaviour on a bus from Hartlepool.

Ceddesfeld Hall is home to many different sections and groups which reflect the interests, pastimes and needs of the community. One such is **Durham Deafened Support (DDS)**, who meet every Monday from 1pm to 3pm.

"On the edge of conversation, one of the loneliest places on earth"

Do you or does someone you know have a hearing loss? Is the hearing loss causing misunderstandings and communication breakdown? It's not only a profound loss that excludes people from the "normality" of everyone else's lives, sudden or gradual, slight or profound hearing loss can have a traumatic affect, it changes lives, only those who have endured it can fully understand the affect that it has not just on the deafened person but on their families also.

DDS employ four lip-reading teachers who teach weekly. They also provide:

- 1:1 support for people or families who are struggling to cope and non residential rehabilitation courses
- 1:1 and group tinnitus support.
- Information and demonstrations regarding hearing aid compatible phones, personal listeners room loops etc; all things that help the deafened person and their families

to cope with hearing loss

- Information/awareness events, taking along hearing aid compatible phones, personal listeners and room loops as well as an abundance of information on Cochlear Implants
- We are a "try before you buy" for BT, Action on Hearing loss (AOHL) and Sarabec which is a local manufacturer of equipment for hard of hearing people
- For older or housebound people, they take equipment to their homes to demonstrate any that could be of benefit to them (they do not sell)

Racing at Sedgefield

£90k investment

Sedgefield Racecourse celebrates 90 years as a limited company this year. Racing has been taking place at Sedgefield since around 1732, with the first recorded meetings in 1846. By the mid nineteen twenties Sedgefield had three meetings, including a lucrative Boxing Day fixture. The current Racecourse Company was founded in 1927, and has seen fixtures gradually increase to the current 20 days.

To celebrate 90 years as a limited company Arena Racing Company has invested £90,000 in to the facilities including the new Bistro 1927 café . The investment also brings the relocation and refurbishment of the Owners & Trainers suite. Following constructive feedback from loyal owners and trainers, it is now located next to the weighing room and parade ring. The refurbishment for the new winners suite is also underway to accommodate more owners and syndicates celebrating their horse's win. It will aptly be named after the legendary trainer Denys Smith. This all ensures further job prospects for the local community and will increase footfall in the village once the marketing campaign begins. WW1 commemorations

February 25th saw the commemoration of two Sedgefield men lost in the Great War, brothers-in-law Herbert Waite Ward and Jack Snaith. Born in 1886, the sixth of eight children, Herbert Waite Ward, lived at 8 East Parade. Aged 15, he was a butcher's apprentice, later working as a fireman at Winterton. He played for the Winterton football team, undefeated in their 1909/10 season.

Jack Snaith, born in 1893, worked as a farm labourer. He lived in The Square with his widowed mother, grandfather and other family members. In 1911, lodger Herbert Waite Ward joined them. In 1912, Herbert married the daughter of the house, Bertha. A year later, their son Herbert W, was born.

Herbert Waite Ward enlisted with the 7th Yorkshire Regiment on 8 October 1915 and was killed in action on 8 February 1917, aged 31. He is remembered on the Winterton memorial in St Edmund's Church and on the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing of the Somme. His brother-in-law, Jack Snaith, a private in the DLI, died 16 days later on February 24th, aged 24. He too is remembered in the Somme region, at Assevillers New British Cemetery.

William Brumpton, related to Jack's mother Dorothy, also lost his life at the Somme on 7 July 1916, remembered at Thiepval. Sad losses to all their families.

Sedgefield Local History Society in association with the Village Veterans commemorates all 42 Sedgefield men lost in World War 1.

The next commemorations will take place on Thursday 4th May (Peter Harkess RNVR and Dr Frederick Hunton RAMC) and Sunday 21st May (John Henry Vickers and William Bradford, both of the Worcester Regiment). Please join us at the war memorial at 10.45am for a brief ceremony.

John Burdon back at Hardwick Hall

The "lost" portrait of the man who created one of the North East's finest 18th Century landscapes is back home at last, after spells in Paris and Tangiers in Morocco. A life-size painting of John Burdon has been unveiled in his mansion, now Hardwick Hall Hotel, after a painstaking piece of trans-continental art detective work.

The painting hung for more than a century in the Banqueting House at Hardwick, but disappeared at the end of the 19th Century. As it flitted from country to country on the international art market, the name of its subject became forgotten until researchers for the hotel's owners, Ramside Estates, found it in December 2014 hanging in an apartment in Paris.

The painting hangs behind the main reception desk so make sure you have a look next time you visit the hotel. See if you can spot St Edmund's Church through the archway.
