## Didn't we have a luvverly time, the day we went to Redcar?

Every year in early July, Sedgefield village would empty of senior citizens, when dozens of them hopped onto coaches and went off for fun-filled afternoon in Redcar. Wilkinson's Coaches of North End Garage ran the Old Folk's Trip for many years. When the trips started they would go to many different destinations. One of the last trips they provided was to Flamingo Land.

When Wilkinsons closed down in the 1950s, Sedgefield Darts and Dominoes League took up the baton to ensure that the trips continued. Its members raised money around the village pubs by running raffles, and by the losers in the league paying half a crown for the privilege.

In recent years this fund has also been supported by the Sedgefield Charities, an anonymous gent's kind donations and by bequests. Linda Maddison gave five hundred pounds from her Charity Fund when she was mayor of Sedgefield. Some years as many as five coaches travelled in convoy to Redcar. Day-trippers were treated to a trip to the coast and money for an afternoon tea.

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## Sedgefield has spoken - and it's the Parish Hall

The results of the recent referendum regarding the Community facilities in Sedgefield were announced on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> July at a meeting of the Town Council. The winner was Option 1: A refurbishment to the existing Parish hall, with 53% of the vote, followed by Option 2: A complete rebuild of the Hall on the existing site, with 43%. Over 50% of the electorate voted. There were some difficulties with the referendum, which was undertaken by the Electoral Reform Society. Some residents did not receive ballot papers and others questioned the overall process. The Electoral Reform Services have issued a statement in response which is on the Council's web-site and notice board.

## How the vote worked in detail

A count of the first choice votes resulted in:			
Option 1 - Refurbishment of the Parish Hall	756	43%	
Option 2 - Complete Rebuild of the Parish Hall	685	39%	
Option 3 - Extending Ceddesfeld Hall	170	10%	
Option 4 - None of the Above	147	8%	
According to the rules of the single transferable	vote system,	Options	3

and 4 were then eliminated and the final result was determined by adding the second choice votes to the first choice count.

The Mayor of Sedgefield, Cllr Dudley Waters was delighted that so many people had voted, while Town Clerk, Lesley Swinbank commented "The issues surrounding the Parish Hall have been ongoing over several years. Now that we have a clear mandate on what our residents want - let's hope we can put everything behind us and move forwards and make progress in providing a much improved community facility for the benefit of all of our community."

## **ANGELS & DEMONS**

by Dan Brown Let the Da Vinci Code create as much fuss as you like - this book is a much better read even than that was. The same central character, Robert Langdon, leads the hunt, this time in Rome.

At the start, a scientist who is working on subatomic particle research at the CERN headquarters in Geneva, is brutally murdered and branded; at the same time the conclave is opened in the Vatican to elect a new pope, but the four most likely contenders are abducted and are threatened with death, one each hour, also with brands on their chest.

I'll spill no more beans. The book is a real page-turner, fast-moving, vivid, brilliant. The way both science and religion are caught up into the plot is very engaging. This is one meaty thriller, which maintains the suspense to the very end. *MQK*

## Cooks' Corner Rhubarb, Raspberry &

Redcurrant Jam

1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lb prepared rhubarb, 1lb raspberries 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lb redcurrants Sugar Juice of 1 lemon

Leave the prepared rhubarb, 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lb sugar and lemon juice to

stand overnight in a bowl. Heat the raspberries and redcurrants until the juices run and then sieve to remove pips. Weigh the resultant pulp.

In a jam pan add the pulp and its weight in sugar to the rhubarb and sugar in the bowl. Boil to setting point (about 20 minutes)

Produces approximately 5 jars of jam - not cheap but very tasty!

## COMMUNITY SAFETY Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood Watch



**Rogue Door Callers** appear to be making increased calls in our neighbourhood. The last two reported incidents (Wheatley Hill & Trimdon Grange) involved 1)selling clothes of poor quality at inflated prices & 2) simply asking for a drink – gaining entrance and a second person carrying out a theft whilst owner distracted.

A white unmarked Fish Van has been operating in the Durham area selling "pensioner's packs" of fresh fish; the fish is frozen, of dubious origin and well over priced – Trading Standards, the Police & N/H/Watch urge everyone to not buy at the door. It is usually a costly exercise and gives the dishonest their opportunity to con honest folk out of their cash at best or actually steal from them at worst.

**Walk in Theft:** this happened to two unlucky residents in the Village on 5th July even whilst the residents were present – how frightening must this have been? Police Crime Prevention continually stress the need to keep doors locked or secure even when you are in the house especially during the fine weather when you might be in & out of the garden; opportunist thieves do operate in our area, in fact some even bus in to steal from our local stores!

N/H/Watch advice is KEEP THE DOOR CHAIN OR DOOR BAR ON AT ALL TIMES WHEN ANSWERING THE DOOR - IF IN DOUBT, KEEP THEM OUT. ## **Domestic Abuse: help for children affected**

National statistics identify that in 90% of incidents of domestic violence a child or children are present or in an adjacent room. Now specialist emotional support for children who have witnessed domestic abuse is now being provided in Sedgefield borough and supported by Sedgefield Community Safety Partnership.

The children will be supported through play therapy and encouraged to express and explore their emotions to help them understand their experiences. Some children are left frightened of loud noises; others lack trust in men. They may regress or turn to self-harm, drink or drugs. The scheme hopes to help them cope with the situation better.

## Jottings from Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum

Another interesting meeting - Mr Charlie Walton Head of Planning and Technical Services at Sedgefield Borough Council gave some interesting insights into the planning process and procedures placed on Sedgefield Village. Several concerns were expressed and recorded with the Borough.

Concern was expressed at the meeting regarding the state of the newly surfaced paths in Ceddesfeld grounds – we have been informed that the contractors have been asked to do remedial work. We are also told that the lighting should soon be in place. A request has been made for the publication of the spend of the £50,000 of 'Peoples Millions' money awarded for the work in Ceddesfeld grounds

As usual detail on the meeting can be found in the Minutes available from the Town Council, in the Library and on the village web sites.

By the time we read this the results of the referendum will be known and it is hoped that co-ordinated and agreed action can be progressed. It was anticipated that a formal referendum on the issue would ensure the whole process was seen to be fair and transparent. It has, however, proved to be controversial - the outcome and review will be very interesting and will surely be raised at the next Forum meeting!!!

The next meeting will be held on September 25th and the AGM on November 27th. (all at 7pm in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall). Everyone is welcome, and we welcome all input – you don't have to have any particular issue just an interest in our community.

## **The Local Improvement Programme**

This is a grant programme run by Sedgefield Borough Council to tackle the issues facing the Borough as outlined in the Community Strategy whilst conforming to Government criteria.

# Over this and the next two years £532,000 has been allocated to projects in Area 3 (the Rural East!) of the Borough (this includes Sedgefield, Bradbury and Mordon as well as Fishburn and the Trimdons).

The money will be allocated by SBC to projects which improve individual sites and buildings and improve the usability and access to buildings and community facilities and are supported by their communities.

At the Area 3 Forum meeting held on 5<sup>th</sup> July support was given to the first projects to apply, both were from Trimdon Colliery. They were worthy projects and were supported. In addition a list was provided for the meeting showing which projects had been notified to SBC's officers as likely to come forward in future months. These included projects in Trimdon Village as well as Sedgefield Cricket Club and at Ceddesfeld Hall (from the SCA).

Apparently no-one has thought to inform the Borough of all the work done towards replacing the Parish Hall (with whatever the referendum comes up with). Another problem is that those communities that are working together are getting on, agreeing their priorities and putting them forward. Is Sedgefield to miss out on this rare opportunity for funding because we have only spent 8 to 10 years arguing about replacing the Parish Hall – our highest priority in the Community Appraisal in 2002?

Sedgefield Development Trust, with the support of the Residents' Forum, has therefore notified the Borough Council of this Community's aspiration to replace the Parish Hall and asked them to expect an application for that to the LIP.

SDT and the Resident's Forum are not against development at the Cricket Club or much needed work at Ceddesfeld Hall, but believes that any LIP money coming to this community should go to the community's priorities. We also feel that the importance of this opportunity is not widely understood. So with the Residents' Forum, SDT has agreed to arrange a public meeting with officers of SBC in attendance to explain and answer your questions about the LIP.

The meeting will be held on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> September in the Parish Hall – just before the next Area 3 Forum meeting, on September13<sup>th</sup> in Mordon Village Hall, so put the dates in your diary and look out for more information in September's Sedgefield News.

# Successful care homes service to expand hours

A new health care service for residents of nursing and residential homes in Sedgefield Borough is set to expand thanks to its success. The Emergency Care Practitioner (ECP) Care Home Service set up by Sedgefield Primary Care Trust (PCT) in June 2005, has carried out over 500 consultations with residents of care homes during its first 12 months.

The service is run by health care professionals drawn from nursing and paramedic backgrounds. After undergoing further training, Emergency Care Practitioners are able to diagnose and treat a wide range of conditions.

Visiting patients in their care homes has resulted in fewer calls for emergency ambulance services and GP visits, as well as reducing the number of admissions to hospital, so from July 17<sup>th</sup> the service extended its opening hours to provide full day time cover from 9.30 am until 9.30 pm, seven days a week.

The ECPs also work in the Urgent Care Centre in Bishop Auckland carrying out a telephone assessment service. As a result, callers are able to receive advice and assistance without having to make a journey to the centre.

## Sedgefield Harriers Juniors

Following sessions delivered at Hardwick and Rectory Row Primary Schools back in June, Sedgefield Harriers Junior Section has been up and running for two months and is regularly attended by 12 children taking part in training activities across the broad spectrum of athletics.

Two under 13s, Andrew Lawson and Chris Lowe, recently became the first Juniors to represent the Club in the recent North Yorkshire South Durham (NYSD) Track and Field League, Shildon. Both competed with distinction against boys a year older than them in the U13 200m and 1000m. Andrew completed a swift 200m breaking the 30 second barrier on a blustery day with a time of 29.9 seconds, finishing second by only 0.1 of a second. Andrew supplemented this performance with a solid 1000m run crossing the line in 6th position in a time of 3:36.1. Meanwhile, Chris was involved in a titanic battle in his 200m race, just losing out on the silver medal when finishing third in 34.4 seconds. Chris then went on to produce a solid performance in the 1000m setting a personal best time of 4:04.5.

## London 2012 in NE England

It may still be six years away but this region is already striving to seize the maximum benefits from the London 2012 Olympic Games and Paralympic Games - the biggest sporting event ever to be staged in Britain. On 21<sup>st</sup> July, a special UK-wide travelling 2012 Games roadshow visited the North East. It took the form of a specially branded London doubledecker bus – hosting VIPs such as Prime Minister Tony Blair, Minister for Sport Richard Caborn and Olympic triple jump champion

Jonathan Edwards - and called at Darlington, Sunderland and Newcastle to taste the region's enthusiasm for the Games. The roadshow was designed to inform local people about preparations for 2012, what the Games can mean for them and how they can get involved. Sebastian Coe, chairman of the London Organising Committee of the Olympic Games, commented: "We hope this roadshow will help people to appreciate just how inspirational the Games can be and the relevance they can have for them and their local communities." Judith Rasmussen, regional director for Sport England North East, added: "The roadshow should put sport high on the agenda and will encourage people young and old - to get involved in the run-up to the 2012 Games and start incorporating physical activity into their own lives.

"We are very proud of the number of exceptional athletes representing the North East in sport, many of whom are already training and pursuing an Olympic dream and the road show recognises their contribution to promoting health and fitness in the region." It's great that the roadshow visited our part of the world and that we heard positive noises from all involved about the opportunities for the people and businesses of North East England to get involved in and benefit from the London 2012 Games. However, it's now up to the region to grasp those chances

and make sure that this part of the country does derive real benefits from an event that will in the most part be taking place about 250 miles away.

Construction firms are already lining themselves up to bid for building contracts at the main site and we have facilities in this region that could host various teams' preparation and training camps. And of course, St James' Park has already been designated as a probable venue for football during the 2012 Games. But none of this is 'in the bag' and so a regional Olympic Forum has been set up to ensure that the North East secures as many benefits as possible from the Games.

Most important of all, the 2012 Games provides the perfect opportunity for communities across the country to make the mantra of taking part in regular physical activity a natural one for the nation's children, inspired by the Olympic ideal. To my mind, that is the real opportunity that London 2012 brings for everyone and is the one legacy it must leave. That's it for this month – please send any sports news to chrisjlines@aol.com.

When representatives of the Town and Borough Councils called adding to the friends and family, their home in Cherry Tree Drive was full to bursting; Jeannette couldn't believe so many people would take the time and trouble to acknowledge their happy achievement but to take time out to visit in person was a complete but very much appreciated surprise.

Married life started in France with two ceremonies being required, Wilf informs us: the first required a formal visit to the Mayor on 22nd of May 1946 to gain his authority to marry the next day 23rd of May in the village church of Ennetierre (situated near Lille). The day was and still is very special to Jeannette, although a modest affair she was attended by her family headed by her dear Maman, Marie Louise Logeais. Of course Wilf was unable to have any family present. Their honeymoon, as for so many post war couples, was helping out at the restaurant and work as normal, a script for the future! By the end of June 1946 Jeannette & Wilf were setting up home together in Sedgefield where they have remained, working together and taking a positive and active part in all aspects of village life. Wilf & Jeannette have participated in many organisations in the village over the years they are always keen to help, and to see Sedgefield keep its village atmosphere whilst developing and improving for the benefit of residents. Presently they are active in supporting Neighbourhood Watch group and the Pop-In Club, and it was at the Pop-In that they enjoyed sharing their "Diamond" cake and final celebrations with valued friends on such a special day. Wilf and Jeannette wish to convey their most sincere gratitude to everyone who was so kind in

turning a very special anniversary into a life-long memorable one.

## August - silly season or wicked month?

... the naming of August seems somewhat haphazard. It is said that in sorting out the calendar, the Emperor Octavian took a day from Februarius and added it to Sextilis, which was then renamed Augustus, an honorary title that had been bestowed upon him.

August 1st is 'Lammas' Day which corresponds to the Hebrew Festival of Weeks when a sheaf of the first of the barley harvest was offered to God (Leviticus 23). The word Lammas first appears in the writings of King Alfred and is derived from the conjunction of "Loaf" and "Mass". Communion was celebrated using bread taken from the first cut of the harvest.

'August is a Wicked Month' was coined by Edna O'Brien as the title of her provocative 1965 novel.

## **Town Council Referendum Information Sheet**

Am I alone in being completely mystified by the Town Council's costs analysis enclosed with the voting papers supplied by the ERS? If one accepts the figures for Option 1 that a 2.8% rise in D Band Council Tax revenue would generate £80,000 then it follows that £500,000 would require a 17.4% increase and £1m would need a 34.9% increase. These calculations match those in the information supplied. When the same formula is applied to Option 3 the range of increase in Council Tax is 14% - 21%. So, which magic formula was applied to result in the Option 3 figure whereby £600,000 would be generated by a 10.5% increase in Tax?

The formula applied to Option £ seems to be "think of a number and halve it"! Why wasn't the same formula applied to Options 1 & 2? Heather Medcalf
