

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

Steve's Nature Diary for December

At this time of the year, if it is frosty, it is well worth having a closer look at one of nature's wonders: a spider's web. Spiders do get a lot of bad press, but you must admit a web is an engineering masterpiece. Spiders belong to class Arachnida along with harvestmen, mites, scorpions and false scorpions. There are 680 species of British spiders (280 are money spiders) and most have eight eyes and none of them are at all dangerous to humans. It is estimated that in grassland reserves such as Durham Wildlife Trust Rainton Meadows or Tees Valley Wildlife Trust Maze Park, an acre of meadow can have as many as two million spiders.

British spiders catch live prey such as flies, bees and moths. All spiders produce silk (for a variety of functions) but not all use silk to catch food. Some families such as the wolf spiders and the jumping spiders use their remarkably acute eyesight to spot prey. They then overpower it either by speed or by jumping on it. Many families however, produce some kind of web to ensnare their prey. The most iconic are the orb-webs built by several spider families. This classic web is the one made by the garden spider (*Araneus diadematus*). These orb-webs incorporate sticky silk which holds the captured prey long enough for the spider to strike. Other webs are nonsticky and are designed so that the legs of prey get tangled. Once caught, the prey is subdued by the injection of poison via hollow fangs. Digestive juices are then secreted over the food and, after a while, the liquid 'soup' is sucked up.

Although they do produce potent venoms with which they immobilise and kill their prey, the vast majority of British spiders cannot break human or pet skin with their fangs. There are a few species that if provoked, can bite and inject venom, but this usually happens when trapped inside clothing or bedclothes, or poked with a finger! The effect of a bite is usually very mild but, as with bee and wasp stings, people's responses vary widely. Most rashes or wounds attributed to a 'spider bite' have other causes – it's almost never a spider.

Although the sight, or even the thought of spiders makes many people distinctly uncomfortable, we should remember that British spiders are largely harmless and do lots of good for people. Spiders are so numerous that they are a vital part of the ecosystems on which we all depend. They catch and eat many of the insects (houseflies, midges, wasps) which bother us in our homes and gardens and help to prevent the build-up of agricultural pests, reducing the need for artificial pesticides. Spider silk is currently of interest to medical researchers as a potential material for making artificial joints and as an aid to regenerating severed nerve fibres. Finally, many people gain immense pleasure from seeing frosted orb-webs on a winter morning and from watching and studying the fascinating lives and amazing forms and behaviours of our native spiders. So next time you are out and about keep an eye out and have a closer look at a spider's web. For more information visit:

Sedgefield Remembers our local servicemen ...

Sedgefield LHS and the Village Veterans continue to organise commemorations at Sedgefield war memorial, remembering the sacrifices made by Sedgefield men and their families 100 years ago. In October, two men who lost their lives within three days of each other in 1917 - Lawrence Gallacher, who was killed in action on the 23rd and Thomas Dryden Ferguson, who died of wounds on the 26th.

Both names are on the on Church Lads' Memorial Shield beside the font in St Edmund's, along with that of Lawrence's brother John, killed in 1915. The two Gallacher boys, both 19 when they died, are also remembered on the Winterton memorial, as their father was an attendant at the hospital, where he regularly took part in amateur dramatics and Glee Club concerts. Private Lawrence Gallacher, 10th Battalion DLI is remembered at Tyne Cot, the largest Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery in the world, last resting place of many who served at Passchendaele, where the battle raged for months from July 31st – November 10th.

Thomas Dryden Ferguson of Cross Street, born in Sedgefield in 1892, enlisted in Hartlepool on 12 May 1915, serving as a gunner with the 15th Brigade Royal Field Artillery. The largest arm of the artillery, responsible for medium calibre guns, howitzers and heavier mortars, they were deployed close to the front line. A family photograph shows Tommy, looking very smart in his uniform. Uncle Tommy, as he is still known to the family, died of wounds on 26 October 1917, aged 25. He is remembered at Lijssenthoek Cemetery in Belgium and is still very much a part of his family's history. Three family members came along in October to pay their respects - great niece Joy Armstrong, great great niece Amy McGowan and great nephew Ian Ferguson, whose recently arrived baby grandson is named after the family's war hero - Thomas Dryden Ferguson.

Our final commemoration of 2017 will be at 10.45am on Wednesday December 27th, when we will remember John James Marshall, who lost his life on Boxing Day 1917. Please spare 15 minutes from your Christmas celebrations to come along in gratitude and respect for another son of Sedgefield lost in battle 100 years ago.

Sedgefield Village Action Group: Important Information for Residents

Taylor Wimpey have submitted an outline application for 60 homes on land known as the stables field, on the left on Stockton Road coming into the town from A689. Yet again, the green land around Sedgefield is being eaten up by more large scale development. The houses planned are mainly large (2½ storeys high), 4 & 5 bedroom detached homes with 10% affordable housing and no provision at all for bungalows.

This open land is important to the historic entrance to the town as green fields either side of Stockton Road provide a rural approach to the centre, through to the conservation area, giving it that village feel. Development here will have a huge negative impact. The land rises up to the village centre so views of the church from A689 and A177 will be affected significantly.

Sedgefield continues to be bombarded with housing applications, and remains extremely vulnerable, firstly because DCC do not have a county plan, which means that there is no definitive assessed housing need for Sedgefield, and (continued foot of page 4)

... and at Winterton

On Friday 10th November, a joint service by the Royal British Legion and Sedgefield Village Veterans was held at St Luke's War Memorial. The banners of The Veterans and the Durham Light Infantry(TA) were paraded.

The service was attended by Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Mrs Andrea Flynn; Sedgefield Mayor and County Councillor David Brown and leader of Sedgefield Council Mel Carr. Prayers were read by Rev Michael Thompson.

Also present were staff from NETPark, members of the public, a contingent of students from the Community College and by no means least, Year 5 of Sedgefield Primary School, who gave a rousing performance of 'It's a Long Way to Tipperary'. Year 5 children then read poems which they had written (*excerpts below and on page 1*).

Wreaths and Poppy crosses were laid to remember the Fallen, but in particular to remember the patients, ex military personnel, incarcerated in Winterton Hospital until they died. Their names are on the Winterton Memorial.




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Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel present

The Alan Sowerby Citizenship Award 2017

to Sam Morrison at Sedgefield Community College.

Somewhat later than normal, the presentation at the college took place on November 11th, when the award, made by Neighbourhood Watch Vice Chairman David Hillerby, was presented to this year's most deserving young citizen, year 10 pupil Sam Morrison (*photograph on page front page*).

Sam has been described as a real "role model" both in and out of school. He has successfully represented the College at various events throughout each of his years at the College. He has been most involved in Science related events which have taken him to venues such as NETPark and Durham University.

Neighbourhood Watch commend Sam for his consideration for others and his willingness to support and assist individuals and groups, both at school and outside school in the local community; we wish him every success for the future.

A Force to be Reckoned With

Durham Constabulary is one of only two forces to have been graded 'Outstanding' in all respects in this year's report from Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary (HMIC). This is the third year in a row that the Durham force has achieved this rare distinction. HMIC highlighted "a high level of achievement in financial planning" and "a culture of inclusivity" in the force's management of its workforce.

Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner, Ron Hogg praised the force for maintaining its consistently high standards and offered his "heartiest congratulations" to all those who have "worked so hard to make this possible".

What does a Police Community Support Officer Do?

The role of a PCSO is to interact with the public and offer assistance to police officers at crime scenes and major events. They complete an initial three-week training course before gaining frontline experience in their PCSO role. Training covers practical issues such as an understanding of the law and a grounding in the use of police procedures and IT systems. It also gives an overview of the skills and strategies that can be used to help in their work dealing with minor offences and offering the early interventions that can often deter people from committing offences.

Additionally, PCSOs provide crime prevention advice to the public and support for front-line policing. Other duties of a PCSO can include conducting house-to-house enquiries and you may also see them guarding crime scenes.

secondly because DCC continue to put up barrier after barrier to the progress of the Sedgefield Plan. The delays have caused worry and deep frustration to residents and Sedgefield Town Council and have given every advantage to the developers.

Residents recognised that the town needed new development and agreed to 300 houses. Up to 400 have now been agreed. Refused applications on other green fields surrounding Sedgefield mount up to over 600. We know from experience that developers will resubmit, time and again. There is nothing in place to stop them!

If this latest application is passed, the argument against a development on the other side of the road is lessened and the outlying boundary for Sedgefield just gets bigger and bigger. On behalf of residents who made their views clear in the formation of the Sedgefield Plan, we will vigorously oppose this development. We're well past the stage of 'enough is enough' and in very real danger of losing the small town, with a 'village at its heart' that we enjoy and benefit from.

SVAG has also been informed that work begins on the 300 residential lodges on Brakes Farm early in 2018. This will of course impact on the infrastructure and local amenities. Once again we have received complaints about the general behaviour of groups of youths around the centre of the village. To prevent further problems can I urge parents to speak with their children advising them not to gather in large groups and to keep the noise down to a respectable level. As the possession and consumption of alcohol is a major factor causing anti-social behaviour, any youth caught flouting the rules will be robustly dealt with. The majority of youths are well behaved and so I hope that common sense will prevail.

Vehicle crimes recorded were the thefts of a Ford Transit van from Naylor Road and a trailer from the Country Park. As reported last month, SSE again won the auction by producing market leading tariffs. Costs for next year indicate an increase on last year but that seems to be significantly less than the market average quoted by the media during this last year.

SDT still believes that Energy Switch gives residents the best opportunity of accessing cost effective energy tariffs, so we intend to continue the scheme next year. The next auction will be held in February so full instructions will appear next month. Meanwhile, don't forget that if your existing energy contract comes to an end before the end of April 2018, you will need to register for this auction.



Rugby Union

Since the last update, Sedgefield District RUFC's first team has had mixed fortunes, beginning with a disappointing 22-5 away defeat to Ryton, and followed by another loss at Sunderland. Despite taking the lead with an early try from Anthony Smyth, penalties and yellow cards resulting from poor discipline, along with enforced changes due

to injury, allowed an average Sunderland side to run out comfortable 34-17 winners. However, Sedgefield appear to have learned from these results, and the pick of November's performances was a resounding 47-8 win against a high flying Whitby team. Sedgefield ran in seven tries, including four from man of the match Adam Grieve. This result was backed up on the road with six tries in a 41-19 victory at struggling Winlaton Vulcans, leaving Sedgefield in the top half of Durham & Northumberland Division 2 after 10 games.

Sedgefield Saxons have started to convert their good early season form into victories. First was a narrow 32-31 win over Hartlepool BBOB, then a more comprehensive 36-0 defeat of Stocktonians, lifting the team off the bottom of the Tees Valley Social League.

Athletics

Last month, I reported that Sedgefield Harrier Justin Cox represented his country as a member of the England Masters Marathon Team at Chester. A few weeks later, Justin took part in the Northumberland Castles Marathon, a two-lap course in Bamburgh (starting in the castle courtyard). Justin led virtually from start to finish, completing the far from flat race in an extremely impressive time of 2:51:52, six minutes ahead of his nearest rival. Not only that, but fellow Harrier Gary Thwaites claimed third place in 3:07:37, demonstrating the strength in depth in endurance running at the club. Fast forward a few weeks, and Justin and Gary were joined by Ray Carmichael to take on the huge challenge of the Peak District South 2 North Ultra, a two-stage race over two days, covering 58 miles on paths and trails, and involving plenty of climbing and a fair bit of navigation. All three Harriers completed the punishing event – a tremendous achievement. Sedgefield Harriers have been out in force as the cross country season becomes a big focus over the autumn and winter. Last year, the senior men were promoted to Division 2 in the North East Harrier League, and this season, they are working hard to consolidate after that success. The club needs to field at least six runners at each fixture and that has proved challenging in the early part of the season as events have clashed with other races entered by Harriers (such as the ultra mentioned above). But along with regular participants, some new members like David Bentley and Mark Raine have really got stuck into cross country (without getting stuck in the mud!) Harriers have fielded full teams at all three fixtures so far and anticipate rising up the league before the end of the season in March.

Although they haven't managed to field full teams at each race, the senior women have also laced up their spikes, representing the club in good numbers.

Meanwhile, supported by head coach Scott Hydon, Junior Harriers have turned out in force for cross country. At a Harrier League meeting in Durham, 20 juniors from U11 through to U15, tested themselves against a muddy, hilly course. With some great performances, they showed signs of huge potential.

Grant Funding: for Businesses and Farmers in Sedgefield Area

Almost £400,000 has been committed to businesses, farmers and rural community groups across the Durham Coast and Lowlands area through LEADER, a funding pot from the Rural Development Programme for England (RDPE). The area covers rural areas between Dawdon in the north to Newton Aycliffe in the south so Sedgefield and surrounding areas including Foxton, Mordon, Bradbury, Fishburn & Bishop Middleham are all eligible for funding between £2,500 and £180,000.

Across the patch LEADER has funded the likes of robotic milking systems, glamping pods, building extensions and the purchase of equipment including a cnc machine, hayledge packaging system and digger. Applications are particularly welcomed by:

- Farmers who want to invest in new innovative pieces of kit such as GPS linked Variable Rate fertiliser spreader, Mobile handling units, crushes and ID systems.
- People starting or developing an existing tourism activity business or developing accommodation whether hotel, b&b or glamping.
- Applicants wishing to start or develop an existing food and drink based business.
- Any business based in the area who are looking to expand and take on or increase hours of current staff members.
- Farmers looking to diversify into non-agricultural based service

Project Coordinator, Sarah explains "LEADER is European funding so I encourage any business or those thinking about starting a business to come forward before the funding disappears. From what we have in the pipeline only 30% of the budget will be left for new projects. The Sedgefield area is new to this funding so it would be fantastic to continue to support the area".

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
