Bishop's Fen to bring back nature to the River SkerneDiscover Brightwater and Durham Wildlife Trust recently

held an event to mark the official dedication of Bishop's Fen, between Sedgefield and Bishop Middleham. At 218 hectares, it's part of the bigger Great North Fen project,



which is bringing nature and biodiversity back to 850 hectares of land alongside the River Skerne, as it weaves its way through this part of County Durham.

The overall aim of the project is to return the landscape to how it was 300 years ago, before the river was made to run straighter and faster, draining the land around it and making it more profitable for agriculture, but taking away wildlife habitats and reducing biodiversity. Reinstating some twists, turns and carrs through the Great North Fen will not only help nature in the area, but it is also hoped that it will play a role in managing the flood risks for the East Coast Main Line and the A1(M), which run through the area. Reverend Rick Simpson, the Archdeacon of Auckland, led the dedication of Bishop's Fen, and cut a willow branch to officially 'open' it. Remembering with Respect at Winterton

Respect was the theme of the day, as Year 5 pupils represented Sedgefield Primary School at this year's Remembrance Service. Many VIPs attended this local community event, including local veterans, our local vicar, Mayor of Sedgefield and many more, alongside the Lord Lieutenant, who represents the crown.

Year 5 pupils from both local primaries at Sedgefield joined together to open the ceremony with a march alongside local veteran, Richard, who presented the stand. Pupils commented that they were honoured to be part of such an event and they have been interested in learning about the history of Winterton Hospital in the lead up to the service.

Our Year 5 class opened the event with a performance poem called, 'The Inquisitive Mind of a Child'. It reflected that war has no winners and comes at a huge sacrifice to humanity.





We were delighted and proud that an ex-pupil of Sedgefield Primary, Nancy, played 'The Last Post' in the lead up to the two minutes silence. The spirit of our school is community and this important event reflects that ethos to the core.

Andrea Flynn, The Deputy Lieutenant for County Durham informed Year 5 pupils that the Winterton Service is one of her favourite annual community events to attend, due to the community spirit and support from local schools. We are extremely honoured to be part of such a significant community event.

Remembrance Day

Sedgefield's Remembrance Day Service this year was a poignant occasion, bringing together the local community to pay tribute to the sacrifices made by those who served in the armed forces.



The ceremony began with a parade featuring the Sedgefield Village Veterans Standard, which led a procession of residents, veterans, and pupils through the heart of the village. The crowd gathered at the cenotaph, where the atmosphere was filled with solemnity and respect. The service included contributions from Sedgefield Primary School, whose pupils delivered a heartfelt poem about the poppies, symbolising the remembrance of those who lost their lives in battle.

This was followed by a moving rendition of the National Anthem, performed by our children from Sedgefield Hardwick School. A key moment of the ceremony was the laying of the wreath at the cenotaph in Winterton. The Reverend David Lucas, of St Edmund's Church, offered a prayer reading, which set a reflective tone for the gathering.

As the ceremony progressed, the "Last Post" was played by a pupil from Sedgefield Community College. This



act of remembrance was followed by a two-minute silence, observed by all in attendance, in honour of those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

Further readings and tributes were shared, offering a tribute to the bravery and dedication of past service people. The ceremony concluded with the Lord's Prayer, bringing the community together in a moment of quiet reflection. This year's Remembrance Day service was a moving and respectful tribute to all those who served and sacrificed for our country. It reminded us of the importance of remembrance and the strength of community spirit in Sedgefield.

Community facilities

When Sedgefield Community College became an academy in 2020, unlike many other schools, our name did not change. It was important for the school that the name remained as the importance of 'community' is crucial to our school values. One of the primary ways in which the school looks to take a key role within our local area is through the availability of the school's sporting facilities that can be booked for community use.



All of these bookings take place through 'The Hub' and there is a wide range of facilities that are extensively used. In addition to grass football pitches, we have 3G and artificial football pitches. External tennis courts can also be hired. Internally, facilities include a large multi-use sports hall, dance studio and fitness suite.



At this time, we have 7 local football teams who play their home fixtures on the school site. As well as this, we have approximately 30 other local clubs and sporting organisations who are regularly based at SCC, including some such as Sedgefield Harriers and The Bulls wheelchair rugby team, who have been part of our wider community for many years.

Pavement Parking

The Bicycle and Active Travel group have had a lot of interest in improving pavement parking in the area, with many people concerned about pavements being blocked by inconsiderately parked cars. There have also been many incidents of illegal parking on double yellow lines and the zebra crossing zig-zags.

Pavement Parking is Dangerous Obstruction to Pedestrians: Vehicles parked on pavements obstruct the path for pedestrians, forcing them to walk on the road.

Damage to Pavements: Pavements are not designed to bear the weight of vehicles. Parking on them can cause cracks and other damage, leading to costly repairs.

Restricted Access: Pavement parking can block access for wheelchair users, people with pushchairs, and those using mobility scooters, making it difficult for them to navigate safely.

Safety Hazards: Damaged pavements can become trip hazards, increasing the risk of accidents for all pedestrians.

Legal Aspects of Pavement Parking In the UK, pavement parking is generally illegal. Local councils have the authority to enforce restrictions. In County Durham, parking on pavements where there are waiting restrictions, such as yellow lines, can result in a parking fine

How to Report Pavement Parking If you encounter a vehicle parked on a pavement in County Durham, you can report it to the local council or the police:

Council Reporting: If the vehicle is parked on a pavement with waiting restrictions, you can report it to Durham County Council. They have the authority to issue fines and take action against the offending vehicle. Police Reporting: If there are no waiting restrictions but the vehicle is causing a significant obstruction or danger, you should report it to the police. They can address the issue under obstruction laws.

To report a vehicle, you can contact Durham County Council's Parking Services via email at parkingservices@durham.gov.uk or by phone at 03000 263 9854. For urgent issues, you can call the police on 101 or 999 if it's an emergency.

U3A UPDATE

Mark Braithwaite, ex-head of Cleveland Police CID gave a most excellent talk on the criminal case which changed the rules governing Double Jeopardy at trial. Until 2003, a person could not be tried twice for the same offence, even in the face of new positive evidence. Mark explained that William Dunlop originally stood trial for a murder in 1989. The jury could not reach a verdict and, as the prosecution offered no further evidence, a not guilty verdict was given. While in prison for a different offence, Dunlop admitted his guilt of the murder to a cellmate. As he could not be re-tried on that count he was prosecuted with perjury and sentenced to six years in prison. Meanwhile, Ann Ming, the mother of his original victim was fighting a strong and intense battle through court and with the government to have the law changed. In 2003, the High Court in London made the decision. 'Retrials would be permitted in respect of a number of very serious offences where new evidence has come to light'. Dunlop was re-tried for murder, and received a life sentence. Our Science and Industry Group had an extremely interesting outing on the Weardale Railway when we attended a Dark Skies Stargazing event. We were blessed with dry, warmish weather, no moon and a cloudless sky. Dropped off in a dark field mid-way between Frosterley and Wolsingham, we found a battery of telescopes had been set up and manned by members of Bishop Auckland Astronomical Society. They explained the various planets, stars and constellations we could see and how modern telescopes had widened scientific knowledge of the skies. We were able to clearly see Saturn's rings and Jupiter's Great Red Spot, follow the newest comet, plot our direction using the Plough and the North Star and marvelled how busy the skies are with commercial, private and military aircraft as well as the great number of satellites perpetually crossing the skies.

Having been commissioned to write a modern Pantomime by Radio Tyneside, the Creative Writing Group is completing their edit of 'Snow White and the Seven Geordie Dwarves' and are preparing for rehearsals which start shortly. It will be broadcast at 7pm on 18 December. Do listen in. The Lunch Club visited Wynyard Golf Club where we all enjoyed another lovely meal. The weather again added to the day as we were able to watch cross the golf course in bright blue sunshine.

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY DECEMBER 2024

I have just got back from doing an enrichment after-school session with some secondary pupils from Middlesbrough. An after-school club in November starting at 4pm, I hear you think! And yes, it was getting dark when we finished but many of the pupils hadn't been out on a nature reserve at dusk, it was a magical experience.

We were at Portrack Marsh in the heart of Teesside and were very lucky with the weather - it was still relatively mild, we had amazing red skies as the sun was going down and, in the distance, we could see the lights of cars going over the flyover, very atmospheric. We started by having a quick pond dip to see what we could find: sticklebacks, minnows and lesser and greater water boatman caused lots of excitement.

As it got darker, we walked to the river and there was so much to see and hear. A skein of pink footed geese flew over with the recognisable honking sound, lots of black headed gulls silently floating down for the evening, an occasional quack as the ducks landed in the reeds for the night and the explosive song of a cettis warbler gave us all a fright.

We continued our walk - it was quite dark now, but it was light enough to see a short-eared owl quartering over the marsh and the occasional small murmuration of starlings swirling over the reed beds before they too fell into the reeds to sleep safely in large groups safe from predators.

So, I would highly recommend a dusk walk around a nature reserve for a slightly different experience even in winter because you never know what you might find.

Winter is also a good time to visit the coast and there is a number of birds that you might see there. One of my favourites that spends its time feeding along the tide line is the snow bunting. Around 13, 000 of these sparrow sized birds spend the winter in the UK. They are large, beautiful, pale buntings, often found in fluttering flocks, flashing varying amounts of white in their wings as they fly. Another flocking bird is Twite. This LBJ (little brown job) is the northern breeding equivalent of the closely related Linnet. It is a similar size, but browner and streakier, with an apricot wash to the face, yellow bill and the males have a pink rump. So, remember there is no such thing as bad weather, just the wrong clothes, so get out and go for a winter walk.



Making the most of the surprisingly dry Autumn weather, the Homes and Gardens Group visited Thorpe Perrow Arboretum where they marvelled at the glorious flamboyance of the acer plantations plus the other marvellous trees which have been able to hold onto their seasonal colour for so long this year. An experience not to be missed.

He was appointed organist of St. Giles, Durham City and, since 1999, has held the post of organist at St. Edmund's Sedgefield.


After 25 years' service, Alex will be returning to his home in Canada on 9 December. His final service at St. Edmund's will be on 5 December for the Civic Carol Service.

There's plenty of sports news to share this month, so I'll dive right in....

Athletics

Last month, I promised an update on recent performances by Sedgefield Harriers in road and trail races. The following isn't exhaustive, but covers some notable runs.



Several club members travelled to the North West for the Chester Marathon on Sunday 6 October, where Jane Spink wore the England vest that she had previously earned and finished in another impressive time of three hours, 22 minutes and 36 seconds. In the same event, Harriet Morris made her debut at the marathon distance, and Steve and Tracy Foreman completed the course together. That same day, Declan Munnelly, John Haycock and Helen Shaw took on the tough, undulating challenge of 'Britain's most beautiful' marathon up at Kielder. On the same day, Christine Hearmon and Chris Lines took part in the Kielder Half Marathon, while on the previous day, Susan Milburn and Sue Dobson ran the Kielder 10K.

A couple of weeks later, seven Harriers tackled the Yorkshire Marathon in really tough weather conditions. Leading them home in a fantastic time of 2:53:01 was Justin Cox, followed by Lisa Darby in 3:20:30. Justin and Lisa qualified to represent England in the V50 Masters category as a result of their times. Well done to both! In the same race, Harriers Alistair Brown, Mark Chapman and Beth Raine all finished in personal bests, of 3:42:36, 4:09:49 and 4:20:06 respectively. Gary Forster and Mark Raine also put in strong runs, helping clubmates to achieve their targets in the process. On the same day, Ben Potter made his debut in a Harriers vest in the Yorkshire 10 Mile race, finishing in an excellent time of 1:02:22, and Graham Darby also ran well at the event.

Meanwhile, back up in Northumberland, Sadie Abel was second lady in the Northumberland Castles Half Marathon in a time of 1:36:19, and Ian Spencer also completed the scenic route that starts and finishes in the shadow of Bamburgh Castle. In County Durham, Rosie Warnett, Claire Lee and Emma Featherstone took on the Wild Deer Ultra (a little over 30 miles), starting and finishing in Shotley Bridge and taking in trails and tracks on a clockwise route around the surrounding countryside. All three finished in just over six hours. Like the runners in Yorkshire, the Harriers in action in Northumberland and County Durham that day had to contend with extremely challenging weather conditions.

While they were all drying out, Harrier Cat Miller was reflecting on her trip to the USA to take part in one of the world's six marathon majors, the Chicago Marathon. Cat picked up a hip injury in the first 10 miles, but battled on to complete the race in 4:46:45 – I think that's the third of the six majors that she's now ticked off. She's now resumed her relentless pursuit of long distance running events.

Talking of long distance, Gary Thwaites has been up to his usual tricks, this time claiming 16th place in the 13 Valleys Ultra, a 180km race in the Lake District, with lots and lots of climbing. Gary completed the race in 35:17:58 – another hugely impressive performance.

Sue Dobson was elected as the new chair of Sedgefield Harriers and those attending agreed to support Cancer Research UK as the club's nominated charity for the next year, in memory of member Ali Horton.

Squash

As December arrives, the first third of the squash season has been completed in County Durham. All six Sedgefield Squash Club teams have been involved in some epic matches during the last few weeks. The league tables are looking good for the club, with the 2nd, 3rd and 4th teams all sitting at the top of their divisions. Sedgefield 1st team are currently fourth in Division 1 with two games in hand, which means that two wins will take them to the top. By their high standards, the ladies' team have had a mixed start with one win from three matches, but it is still all to play for in their division.

In a recent Professional Squash Association event held in Norton, Sedgefield's Rob Pearce won the A event, beating fellow teammate Colin Langley on the way to the title. In the upcoming County Championships to be held at Nunthorpe, Sedgefield will have several players competing across several grades. I will include an update on their results in the next edition of Sedgefield News. On a national level, Huey Lamb finished a very creditable 28th in the under 13s British Championships. Huey had some very close 3-2 defeats against older opponents - he has just stepped up to this age group. Well done to Huey for flying the Sedgefield flag at the national championships. As always, the courts at the club are proving very popular and the latest Squash Stars programme is underway, paving the way for young people to get active and enjoy sport.
