## Ken Saiger is Sedgefield's Citizen of the Year for 2010

A very surprised Ken Saiger was presented with an illuminated certificate and engraved glass decanter on becoming Sedgefield's 'Citizen of the Year' for 2010 - he thought he had come to take photographs of the award ceremony! In presenting the award the Mayor, Cllr. Allan Blakemore, reflected on the many things Ken was involved with. He is a founder member of the Neighbourhood Watch scheme and was instrumental in the introduction of the Flask in Fridge which gives vital information to the emergency services. He has raised awareness of the need to improve the safety and security of the elderly, disabled and vulnerable in their homes, fitting security measure and smoke alarms to peoples' homes. ## Jottings from the Residents' Forum meeting

The December meeting did not go ahead as there were only 6 of us turned up (sensible people stayed 'tucked up' at home) so we 'retired' to Dun Cow and put the 'world to rights' there!!!

So just a quick update – we are still pursuing the Section 106 monies overdue for use in our village. Through asking a Freedom of Information question we have been told that the original £45850 given to the Local Authority by the developer has accrued £8033 interest. However, Durham County Council (DCC) states "The interest amounts are not attached each project because the monies go into a general interest bearing account. The interest that is earned is incidental to the project and it reflects the time between the capital being committed and the project being completed." Despite asking we have been given no further update on progress on this 106 agreement, but will maintain efforts to get this money appropriately spent in our village.

We had some success on footpath repairs, after Cllr Brown contacted highways we had a very helpful meeting with officers from DCC Highways (really refreshing to find some DCC Officers who know about customer service). The Officers gave commitment to some repairs so long as the weather held out to December 16<sup>th</sup> to allow time for works – so the snow has certainly stopped that and the Officer could not give any commitment into next year's budgets – so we will have to keep up the pressure for repairs next year. One point of concern is that DCC think some areas are the responsibilities of our Town Council (TC) but the TC believe it to be DCC responsibility!

No further update on the Spring Lane wind turbines either, we are still awaiting planning officers recommendations on the application and the date of the planning meeting. But in the mean time the group of residents from Spring Lane/Foxton Lane are working on their case of objection. They do need your support on this issue so please watch out for updates and support your fellow residents

Our approach to the Sedgefield Together Group to try to form a comprehensive communication group for our village to cut out some of the duplication and confusion has only resulted in the Together Group agreeing to establish a 'virtual' network (email communication) to inform people who are 'signed up' to receive information. So at this point in time the Residents Forum will carry on as we are but we would really welcome residents to come along to the February meeting and give us your views.

So the next meeting is February 7<sup>th</sup> 2011 7pm in the Fletcher Room – there will be a reminder in the January Sedgefield News. So we wish you all a happy and peaceful Christmas and New Year and look forward to seeing you in 2011.

One final thank you to the Sedgefield News team for all their hard work in keeping our village informed over the past year. Sedgefield News is one of the best projects ever established in our village – thanks to you all.

Another year draws to a close and 2010 has certainly been blessed with some fantastic sport, both close to home and around the globe. We've seen the Commonwealth Games in Delhi (which eventually went very well despite some, er, teething problems) and the FIFA World Cup, which was a triumph for the vuvuzela and Spain (but a disaster for Italy, France and, inevitably, England). Further football disappointment was to follow at the start of this month, when FIFA awarded the right to host the 2018 tournament to Russia. I don't think I'm alone in believing that the whole bidding process was a bit of a farce really, and that the final result was, shall we say, somewhat pre-ordained. What Sepp wants, Sepp gets. Despite the many significant deficiencies of the England 2018 team and their campaign, the whole FIFA circus was a downright disgrace (in my humble opinion). The great shame is that the various Candidate Host Cities around England did a great job in their own contributions to the overall bid, with no reward. They included Sunderland and NewcastleGateshead, both of which would have been fantastic hosts for World Cup matches. Oh well, perhaps 2030 will be the year for England. And as for Qatar being chosen to host the 2022 tournament...

The cricket season has also been entertaining. England finally won a global trophy, bagging the World Twenty20 Cup early in the year. However, everything in 2010 was a warm up for the Ashes, which are underway in Australia now. It was all looking so good for England after the first two Tests, but as I type this, it is very likely that the teams will be level as they prepare for Boxing Day in Melbourne. Never a dull moment. Meanwhile, in Sedgefield, the Harriers have gone from strength to strength, as has the squash club, the rugby club and the cricket club. And on the football pitch, both NETPark FC and the Black Lion FC were promoted from their respective league divisions, Sedgefield Youth FC continued to develop well and St. Edmund's FC performed well near the top of the Durham District League. And of course Bradley Saunders won a boxing silver medal at the Commonwealth Games.

But forget all of that, it's time for the darts! The PDC World Darts Championship is already underway, and has been pretty underwhelming so far (pre-Christmas). It reminds me of the group stages of the Champions League – a bit dull, but helps to fill the coffers of the organisers and the TV company. It'll soon pick up though, and no sooner is one world champion crowned than the more established BDO global tournament will begin over at the Lakeside, Frimley Green. So, it's silly nicknames, tungsten and slightly ridiculous commentary to the fore for the next few weeks. Bliss!

### Squash

Sedgefield Squash Club hosted the sixth mini-squash competition for local primary schools recently. The competition and pre-competition coaching again attracted three schools: Sedgefield Primary, St. William's (Trimdon), and Trimdon Juniors. This year, Ian Wood toured the schools before the start of his first term at Bristol University after Emma Larcombe had initiated the sessions at Trimdon. Sam Wileman, ex-England junior number one and England Squash South Yorkshire coach made a guest appearance at Trimdon before flying off to take up a post in Chicago.

Four teams of five players entered the competition. Dr James Larcombe organised the event, with help from teachers at the schools and Sarah Hepples (sports co-ordinator for Sedgefield Community College). Year 6 pupils Olivia Skilbeck and Rory Fletcher refereed most of the matches, showing great skill and patience. This year, the event followed a full round-robin format. The second round was nail-biting with Sedgefield A managing to peg St William's back in all but one game, and Sedgefield B edging out Trimdon 38-37. In the final round, St William's needed to win all their games, and Trimdon needed to beat Sedgefield A to influence the final positions. In the end, neither happened, but at one point it looked very close! The morning competition was a resounding success, with many excellent performances from children new to the game, as well as from more experienced players.

Final results: 1<sup>st</sup> Sedgefield Primary A 150 pts (three wins); 2<sup>nd</sup> St Williams 138 (two wins); 3<sup>rd</sup> Sedgefield Primary B 102 (one win); 4<sup>th</sup> Trimdon Juniors 94 (no wins).

wear and tear and the condition of existing fillings, crowns, etc.

- Examine your Temporo - Mandibular Joints. These are the joints between the lower jaw (the mandible) and the temporal bones (base of your skull). Discomfort and muscle pain from these joints may indicate abnormal wear of the teeth and a clenching or grinding habit due to stress.
