Many congratulations to Alison Hodgson - Sedgefield's new Citizen of the Year

Prompting comments like "She has no fear - she just gets stuck in!" and "She's always willing to help out", Alison Hodgson is a worthy winner of Citizen of the Year award and really is an outstanding citizen.

Alison and husband Bill settled in Sedgefield as newlyweds over 41 years ago. Their son and daughter were raised here and they now have six grandchildren. As parents they were active with their children, particularly in sport - orienteering, fell walking and later, badminton - and Alison always played an active role in the community.

With history as her specialist subject (she is heavily involved in the Sedgefield Local History Group) Alison played a major part in the creation, some years ago, of the very successful Sedgefield Heritage Trail - such a help and delight to visitors. She has also been active in bringing the historical delights of Hardwick Park to the public, as a volunteer ranger, a Friend of the Park and taking every opportunity to help at archaeological digs and historical re-enactments.

As well as being an active member of St Edmund's church for many years, Alison is joint treasurer of the 'Friends of St Edmund's', helping with fundraising activities and organising trips, but since retiring from a career in teaching, her commitments have burgeoned, and certainly her energy and commitment was much called for during the last year.

An active member of the Sedgefield 700 committee, Alison helped bring the many and varied celebrations of the anniversary of the Market Charter to fruition. July 2012 also saw her become a published author, with "Sedgefield in Victorian Times", which required an immense amount of historical research.

Having completed her own family tree, Alison now does the same for others, as well as sometimes advising people on how to trace their own roots - help which is very much appreciated. Involvement with Walking and Cycling groups, the Twinning Association, the Hand Bell ringers and the WI and probably more that we don't know about, lends an air of improbable truth to Roger Clubley's comment, as he announced the name of the recipient at the Mayor's Annual Cheese and Wine evening: "We lesser souls have a mere 7 days each week. Alison has 14, or so it seems!"

The Citizen of the Year Award is given jointly by Sedgefield Development Trust, The Rotary Club of Sedgefield and Sedgefield Town Council, after assessing nominations received from the public.

A further award was presented to David Hillerby and Tim Spearey, of Sedgefield Village Veterans. County Councillor Linda Marshall, Chairman of the Council, can be seen at the bottom right of the photograph. She is a very strong supporter of the group and gave a very sincere appreciation of the Veterans' activities in recognising the service and sometimes sacrifice of British servicemen, both in the past and in the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. In particular she drew attention to the Veterans' parades honouring each death in the current hostilities.

Accepting the award, David Hillerby insisted that it was for the whole group, not individuals, and Tim Spearey gave an emotional account of the important part that Sedgefield Village Veterans has played, in giving meaning to his life since the death of his beloved wife.

Beanstalk

The national children's literacy charity Volunteer Reading Help (VRH) has changed its name to Beanstalk to celebrate its 40th Anniversary.

The idea behind the new identity is to clearly indicate that Beanstalk is a children's charity which provides the largest national volunteer reading scheme for primary school children in the UK. Beanstalk is also a legal name change of the charity.

"We want to get across the magic of what happens when you combine a child who is struggling with their reading with someone who has a passion for reading and has the time to provide sustained one-to-one support," says Sue Porto. "The service Beanstalk provides is more relevant than ever before - almost 71,000 children left primary school in 2012 unable to read to the required standard. They face the a lifetime of underachievement and social/economic exclusion if they don't catch up. We would encourage people to contact us to find out how they can help us achieve this by becoming a Beanstalk reading helper, supporting our work financially or working with us in their local primary school."

Jottings for December from Residents' Forum meeting

There was no meeting in December but things have still been happening. Some residents and representation from the Forum attended the planning meeting regarding the erection of the marquee for music events at the Racecourse. Residents' concern, based on past evidence, was the possibility of ongoing noise disturbance and if the marquee was going to be given permission we wanted relevant protective conditions to apply. The marquee had been erected and events held prior to planning permission but there was no particular reprimand for the clear non-observance of planning regulations and permission was granted. The Councillors (from across the County) on the planning committee made not one single comment acknowledging residents' concerns and the words 'get a life' were even said. In our opinion this was shameful behaviour from councillors who are supposed to represent peoples' views. However, Cllr Brown (our own County Councillor) spoke well in supporting residents' concerns. Only about a dozen people attended the Town Council meeting which gave feedback on the results of the questionnaire circulated to gather the views of the village on future housing development. The Town Council, via employed consultants, have again sent in a very good and comprehensive response to the County Plan again stating that the maximum number of houses should be 300 and should be spread in small developments. We must remain very aware of housing development proposals for our village, whilst the County are still proposing 450 on land at Eden Drive other developers, in addition, are putting in planning applications for hundreds of homes. If you have open land near you watch out for information - and please do attend consultation meetings and give your views!

The next Forum meeting will be on January 7th at 7.0pm in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall - everyone is welcome. The Forum would like to wish everyone a peaceful and happy Christmas and New Year. We will look to continue to protect the character of our village, so come along and join us in 2013.

No Deputy for Police & Crime Commissioner

Durham's new Police and Crime Commissioner, Ron Hogg, has vowed not to take on a Deputy PCC in his first term of public office. Under the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act, PCCs are entitled to appoint a deputy PCC. So far, 15 of Ron's 40 counterparts up and down the country have done so. However, Ron has confirmed that he will not be following this lead: "Unlike many other PCCs, I am fortunate in that I have over 30 years experience as a former police officer and know how the system operates. As far as I see it, the people of County Durham and Darlington elected me to represent their needs and having a Deputy PCC was never part of the deal."

PCC salaries have been determined nationally. However, it is up to each PCC to decide how much they pay their Deputy PCC. This has naturally sparked criticism from Police Think Tanks who believe that the substantial salaries emerging for Deputy PCCs would be better used on front-line policing.

In a statement in response to the intention to reduce the starting salary for constables by £4,000, Mr Hogg said: "I think this decision is absolutely outrageous and disgraceful and it is likely that this will impact on police recruitment in the future. Policing can be a very dangerous job, as recently seen in Manchester. Brave young people often put their own lives at risk and this is how they are treated by their country".

Ron Hogg launched his first public consultation with residents, just weeks after beginning his new role. He said: "I want to know what you think the police and crime community priorities within County Durham and Darlington should be, and what you think the increase (if any) in the police precept (police element of council tax) should be for 2013-14". He would like people to describe the three most important issues they believe the police should be tackling to improve the local area. A zero per cent increase in Council Tax will attract a 1 per cent Central Government grant worth £250,000 per year for the next two years only, whereas a 2 per cent increase would add £500,000 to the budget every year from 2013/14 onwards. Views are also sought as to whether the public would consider paying a 3 per cent increase, which would mean £750,000 per year from central government from 2013/14. A meeting was held recently at the parish hall, where members of the public were able to speak with local officers. It was agreed that the Neighbourhood police team would focus their attentions in Durham Road; in particular, the manner of driving of some motorists going through the chicanes. There have been some complaints of near miss accidents. Please slow down on approach to the chicanes and drive with consideration for other road users when passing through them. Local Church clarifies position on housing land

I write as Lay Chair of the Parochial Church Council of the Parish of the Upper Skerne. The Parish consists of five churches, St Alban's & St Mary Magdalene's in the Trimdons, St Michael's, Bishop Middleham, St Catherine's, Fishburn & St Edmund's, Sedgefield.

The land proposed for sale in the Thurlow Road / Eden Drive area is not owned by the Parish but by the Durham Diocesan Board of Finance. The Board has a duty under charities legislation to make the best use of its assets to help and support the mission and ministry of the Church of England in the Diocese. Funds available from rental income or the sale of glebe land contribute towards clergy pay and housing throughout the Diocese of Durham.

At a meeting of the PCC held at St Edmund's on Monday 10th December 2012 we resolved to submit an objection to the Board concerning the proposed sale, expressing our concerns over the impact this would have in Sedgefield and on the relationship between the Church & the community.

If the land were to be sold the Parish would receive no monetary benefit from the sale & continues to be extremely grateful to all those members of the community & organisations who generously support the work of the Church throughout the Parish.

In this season of Epiphany, I pray that God's blessing will be upon each of our communities throughout the coming year.

Athletics

Sedgefield Harriers held their annual dinner at the end of November and, as always, it was a special occasion which recognised all of the work done over the past year to continue the success of the club. Special guest was Allison Curbishley, BBC commentator and 400m Olympian from Teesside, who gave a fascinating fly-on-the-wall review of London 2012. Harrier Richard Fearnside presented his latest poetical offering on the club's year and then made the Time Trial presentations, with Jonna Baines winning for the men and Abie Hearmon winning for the Ladies. Gail Bell and David Greatorex were winners of the annual club Grand Prix.

The climax of the night was the presentation of the annual club awards, presented by Allison Curbishley. Volunteer of the Year is an award decided by the club committee and made to someone who is not necessarily a member but who has contributed significantly to the club in the past year. The award went to track and field coach Tim Dredge for the work he has done with juniors and also for all of the other things that he does, including supporting other coaches, organising transport to events and contributing to the club website. When the results of the voting by club members on the night were revealed, the winner of Runner of the Year was a very surprised Diane Baines who has made significant improvements in her marathon times. The winner of the Club Member of the Year award was Jane Spink, for her fantastic work setting up Sedgefield parkrun and the mini-Harriers group. The dinner was once again an excellent event and a showcase for the Harriers. The club is grateful to Caroline Hirst and Anne Gladwin for their excellent organisation.

A few days before the annual dinner, the Junior Harriers held their own event. Organised and hosted to a great extent by the young athletes themselves, the evening celebrated the fantastic progress that the juniors have made over the last 12 months. Sedgefield Harriers had a strong turnout at the North East Cross Country Championships at a very muddy Summerhill in Hartlepool on 8th December. A team of eleven senior men and six senior women competed well to finish 18th and 17th in the team positions. Chris Lines took the honours for the Harriers, just pipping club mate David Greatorex by the width of his vest on the line, as they finished 78th and 79th overall. Justin Cox was third Harrier in 94th position. In the women's race, Gail Bell, who had been unwell during the week, was first for the Harriers in 42nd place overall, with Jane Spink next in 51st and Christine Hearmon third Harrier in 70th place.

In the junior races, there were standout performances from Abie Hearmon, 6th in the U17 girls, Kieran Walker, 6th in the U15 boys, Hannah Featherstone, 15th and Emily Robertshaw, 19th in the U15 girls. The U15 boys had the highest team finish for the Harriers, finishing 5th in the North East, with Sean Haycock and Robert Temperley making up the team with Kieran Walker.

The Harriers teams now move on to the Northern Championships in Liverpool on 26th January before returning to home soil (or more likely mud!) when the nationals are held in Sunderland in February.

Next month, I'll have news from St. Edmund's FC, Sedgefield's leading Sunday league team. Meanwhile, I have updates from the other two teams. NETPark FC have so far only gained four points from a possible 21 in the league, leaving the team at the foot of Division One of the Durham and District Sunday League, albeit with plenty of games in hand and a first win now in the bag.

While league form has been very up and down, NETPark are very confident that there will be no repeat of last season's relegation dogfight as performances have given the management plenty of confidence that results will improve. 
Squash

Having endured the disappointment of relegation last season, they hope to bounce back to a more competitive league next season. The 2nd team, also relegated last season, are joint leaders of Division 4, having only lost one game. The 3rd team are well placed at third in Division 5, which is proving a very tight league with the exception of the bottom two clubs. The 4th team, newly created this year, have gradually climbed up to the top of Division 6.

The ladies 1st team have found their division more competitive this season, and currently lie in 3rd, although have played one game fewer than the top two clubs. The ladies 2nd team lie closer to the bottom of their division, although they have competed well in their first competitive season.

Individually, the top 10 points scorers table across all divisions contains four Sedgefield players - Stephen Rowsby, Mark Simpson, Oliver Walls, and Gary Hetherington. In the ladies, Anne Holmes is the 4th highest points scorer.

In the juniors, the club's under 11s team (Jack Stephenson, Chloe Hill, Robert Peacock and David Worthington) performed superbly in their first ever match, winning by 213 points to 171 against Norton U11s, who are always a very strong side. The under 19s put up a brave performance against Yarm, but a relatively young side lost 284 points to 236. The under 15s (Oliver Walls, George Peden, Daniel Toas and Josh Hetherington) posted a big win in their first match of the season, winning 360 points to 141 against Barnard Castle.

Sedgefield Racecourse has been a limited company since 1927 and is a major player in local community engagement, employing local staff, promoting Sedgefield as a place to visit, encouraging use of village facilities, hotels and shops to travelling clients whilst also generating further employee opportunities due to the increased events held.

There have been several events hosted which have raised funds for the local community and there is constant school engagement through the British Horseracing Education Standards Trust creating an insight into racing to encourage local children to understand the prospects of a future career within the racing industry.

The racecourse is restricted by conditions on the Premise Licence which are always adhered to and we will continue to work with the authorities and with the residents to ensure this continues. There is no intention to disturb local residents and to accommodate this we always advertise locally to ensure residents know exactly what the racecourse intends to do in the future.

The noise levels from the events so far are much lower than the restricted allowances in the noise sensitive areas and we would like your continued support when noise monitoring is in progress.

Harriers reply to Sedgefield Xtra

After recent letters in these columns we decided to rest our case and protect the public of Sedgefield from further details of our quest for an athletics track, for now at least. However, I feel it is necessary to reply to the article published by the Town Council in their own newsletter Sedgefield Xtra, if nothing else in order to reassure our members and club stakeholders of our position. Following a 'lively' meeting with the Town Council it was evident that council priorities differed from our own and we took a view that we would gain ground more quickly by pursuing our project using our own contacts and resources. This would also avoid exacerbating a (sadly) already inflamed situation and we took the course of sending a polite letter to thank the Town Council for assistance to this point and advising that we would take our own course at this time, while requesting that the door be kept ajar.

The article in Sedgefield Xtra is disingenuous, implying that our project has been offered unequivocal support that we chose to decline. The Town Council has failed to get behind this very worthwhile project for a significant piece of community infrastructure which would benefit the wider community, including young people and disability groups, as well as a nationally successful sports club. It is in fact the type of infrastructure that is essential to support the population of an ever-growing Sedgefield with a further 450 new houses proposed in the near future.

Sadly, far from the sentiment of the article in Sedgefield Xtra, at the meeting to which I refer, the passive ambivalence of the Town Council manifested itself on the part of some members as active opposition to our project. In the interests of good governance in local government, it would be best for these councillors to declare their interest and take no part in any decisions to be made on the allocation of funds and resources to projects that they are directly involved in, or any other over which there is a conflict of interest. This will help to maintain a level playing field for all.
