Sedgefield's shopping trend goes local

Small Business Saturday was held on 7th December to celebrate small business success and to encourage customers to 'shop local' and support businesses in their communities. This seemed a good excuse to talk about the local shops in our community.

UK consumers have taken to online shopping with enthusiasm, spending more online than any other European country. Since 2006 online sales have grown each year, reaching 20% of total retail sales in December '18. The newspaper headlines tell us of the death of the high street and of town centres becoming derelict. But it doesn't have to be like this. High streets are at the heart of the community and are our "original social network", providing a space in which communities are able to mix freely. This is especially important for more vulnerable or isolated groups; high streets can act as a real focal point for community activity. Sedgefield and the surrounding villages have a number of unique and distinctive shops alongside traditional businesses. You can do your weekly shop at one of the supermarkets, then get that special treat, or maybe several, at one of the smaller speciality shops.

The latest, a 'green' greengrocer, has just opened its doors in Sedgefield.

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GREENER SEDGEFIELD

For sometime we've been encouraged to recycle and reuse but lately it's been emphasised how important it is to reduce or refuse. One way to do this is by eliminating single use plastic. These items are things like straws, coffee stirrers and most food packaging for things like fruit and vegetables which often is unnecessary. Do bananas not already have their own packaging, so why do they need a bag around them? Zero waste stores have been popping up aiming to provide the growing number of discerning customers with more eco-friendly alternatives to pre-packed products. Sedgefield News asked Greener Sedgefield to give an overview of such a venture.

Happily we can report that Sedgefield has their own zero waste store in the newly opened. The Juicy Pear. Owners, Natalie and Mark Barron originally envisaged a greengrocers but decided to encompass a bigger opportunity. Talking to Mark and Natalie they clearly have grabbed the ethos wholeheartedly. Natalie tells us that the stock is as local as possible, reducing carbon footprint. As well as fruit and vegetables, The Juicy Pear encourage customers to bring their own containers and refill on various products including cereals, dried fruits, nuts and seeds.

There are spices and herbs in large jars and you pay for what you need by weight. Dispensers contain liquid shampoo, conditioner, body and hand wash as well as washing up liquid so you can refill and repurpose bottles from home.

Careers Day at Sedgefield Community College.

The Co-op recently took part in a Careers Day for Years 7, 8, 9 & 10 students, alongside representatives from the NHS, Kier Construction, The Armed Forces, Parsons Containers and a range of other potential employers. The Co-op had three information points: Logistics, Stores/Member Pioneers & Funeral Care, and students heard about the various roles and job opportunities in the various branches of the Coop. There were some great questions and comments from insightful kids trying to make sense of the world. One particular comment from a Y10 interested in apprenticeships really stood out! "The Co-op does 21 different types of apprenticeships? That's awesome!" Many thanks to Sedgefield Community College for the invitation. Tim Dredge.

Whilst in the shop we discussed other areas of the house that can have an environmental impact, such as washing up or having a shower.

Most synthetic sponges release tiny plastic particles which then go down the drain, products do exist which prevent this and are made from natural fibres like coconut. The Juicy Pear have

considered these areas too. They were telling us that they have tested and use various products within their home and family before putting the brands on sale.

The importance of being free of unnecessary packaging has been extended to shampoo bars, toothbrushes, and personal hygiene products. Even children have been considered with a range of products aimed at them including reusable drinking straws.

The Barrons admit not everything has been easy to keep plastic free, their biggest struggle having been to

Sedgefield News: from the past

In January 1920–100 years ago Charles Renner, a Fireman on the North Eastern Railway, was leaning out from the cab as it passed through Sedgefield Station. He was struck on the head by a projection from a passing goods train. Renner suffered a fractured skull and died soon after.

In January 1870 – 150 years ago An inquest held at the Black Lion Hotel heard about a fatal accident near Sedgefield. George Carney was employed by Mr Wight, a soda manufacturer from Stockton. On a foggy Tuesday night, Carney was on his way back to Stockton, having delivered a supply of lemonade to Sedgefield. With Carney in the onehorse spring wagon was George Heald, a greengrocer.

Confused by the fog, the horse became disoriented as it approached the stone wall of a bridge after rounding a sharp bend. The horse stopped suddenly, then fell. The wagon over-turned, and the occupants of the wagon were thrown from the wagon into a ditch. George Heald recovered quickly but George Carney was not so fortunate, and died.

The inquest made recommendations for the road to be widened and protection be provided near the wall, to prevent future accidents.

In January 1820 – 200 years ago

A reward of ten guineas was being offered to bring to justice those who had stolen 'A Fat Country Pig'. The pig had been stolen on Christmas Eve the year before. Its owner, John Elcoat, offered five guineas and another five guineas was being offered by the 'Sedgefield Association for Prosecuting Felons.'

Twelve Scams for Christmas Amy Jorgeson, Sedgefield Police Beat Team: It may be the season of goodwill, but thieves and scammers never take a holiday. Some tips to stop you becoming a victim of fraud :

1. Online Shopping Fraud: If possible, use online retailers that you



have used before and have a good reputation. Be cautious when purchasing expensive items, especially those items that seem to be at a price 'too good to be true'.

2. Telephone Fraud: Don't assume a caller is genuine - people aren't always who they say they are, and numbers showing in your phone display can be cloned. Never disclose security details, such as your PIN or full password. Don't be rushed - a genuine bank or organisation won't mind waiting to give you time to stop and think. Auction fraud: Always use recommended methods of payment rather than transferring money direct to a seller. Research the seller before you bid. If available, check their feedback but be mindful this can also be falsified.

4. Holiday fraud: Always pay with a credit card; if they don't accept it don't buy from them. Use companies that are ABTA or ATOL protected.

5. Loan and investment scams: Reputable loan providers will not ask for an advance fee. If they ask for an advance fee just say no. Research any loan or investment companies online before making any financial commitment.

6. Ticketing fraud: Only buy tickets from reputable ticket sale, or resale, websites that are licensed to resell tickets and offer protection to buyers.

7. Donating to charity: Visit the charity's website by typing the address into your browser rather than clicking on a hyperlink embedded in an email, social media or online ad.

8. Mobile malware/malicious apps: Make sure you have the latest software installed on your mobile device for increased protection. Only download apps from official app stores like Google Play, Apple Store and Microsoft.

9. Links to websites: If you receive a link through email/social media, please be aware, these can contain malware that could infect your computer; e-cards are an example of how this can happen. Always check the sender is someone you trust before you click on the link and ensure your anti-virus is up to date.

10. Social media scams: Be careful about the personal information you put on your social media accounts. Check your privacy settings to ensure that you are only sharing the information with the people that you want to.

11. Dating fraud: Guard your privacy when chatting online & be selective with the information you provide about yourself. Never send money or give credit card or online account details to anyone you do not know and trust. Trust your instincts, if something feels wrong act on it.

12. Mobile payments: Always ensure that your phone has a strong password, or make use of the biometric settings to safeguard what is on your phone from unauthorised access. If lost or stolen, most mobile devices have the software to wipe all data from their memory remotely - learn how this works. If you have difficulty get a trusted friend or relative to help.

Police Report

Sedgefield Police Beat Team have reported 35 incidents in Sedgefield in the month prior to 11th December 2019. This included:

Thefts: farm tractor stolen; thefts from the Co-Op, Sainsburys and Bolams (12) incidents in total); and theft of diesel (3 incidents)

Burglaries: residential burglary - theft of central heating boiler. From 22 October to date there have been 5 burglaries at the Co-Op. The burglaries are planned and different vehicles have been used. One person has been arrested and released on bail. It has been suggested by Police that internal shutters be fitted to deter criminals. Local police are working with CID to trace others responsible. Anti-Social Behaviour: 3 incidents. Our Police Beat Team reported that crime in Sedgefield is very low compared to surrounding areas but we need you, to remain vigilant and report suspicious activity promptly and in complete confidence.

Dawn of the Age of Graphene

NETPark is home to the CPI Graphene Centre, a focus of expertise on this wonder material. But what is graphene? Why does it attract so much corporate interest? Think back to school science. Graphene is pure carbon, which exists in different forms, e.g. diamond and graphite, because its atoms can link to each other in several ways. Graphene is a single sheet of graphite comprising a one atom thick 'net' of carbon atoms arranged in a hexagonal array reminiscent of the geometry of a bee honeycomb, or the structure of chicken wire fencing. It has been referred to as a 'two dimensional material' - one of its dimensions comprises the diameter of a single carbon atom! This arrangement of carbon atoms imparts several remarkable properties.

Graphene is the thinnest and lightest material known, with a very high strength:weight ratio (200 times stronger than steel); it has high electrical & thermal conductivity along the plane of the carbon sheet, much higher than copper or silver. It is the best heat conductor at room temperature, and the best electrical conductor known. In fact, latest research indicates that room temperature superconductors can be developed from graphene.

Its optical properties are also under intensive study, for it is almost totally transparent. Along with high electrical conductivity, lightness & phenomenal strength, graphene can be ideal material for more efficient solar panels, LCDs etc.

The CPI Graphene Centre helps with developing & commercialising new products. It has attracted several new start-ups to NETPark, to work on gamechanging formulations, e.g. graphene epoxy & polyester resins for anticorrosion coatings and paints; additives to strengthen concrete; combination of graphene with aerogels to produce the strongest, lightest, most resilient materials ever developed, with uses in bullet-proof armour, aerospace, renewable energy generation; manufacture of revolutionary medical devices & sensors; in desalination of seawater, domestic water purification, separation of oil from water, waste water treatment; improving the effectiveness of personal hygiene products. Finally, the application of graphene formulations to computer chip and printed circuit technology will revolutionise electronics and computing.

The positive impact on the UK economy cannot be overestimated. We are very fortunate to have a local centre of energetic, innovative expertise focussed on a truly game-changing discovery. AF

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY JANUARY 2020

Some of you who read this column may have seen a recent Countryfile programme (December 1st) which was based in the Tees Valley. (*Photo right*)

The Tees Valley Wildlife Trust managed to get coverage for a couple of projects and even I made a very brief appearance! I was leading a guided walk at Errington Woods, New Marske as part of "Sensing the Wild" funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund. The project aims to take groups of blind and visually- impaired people out to experience wildlife and nature across the four seasons in local green spaces.

The Trust is working with Going for Independence, a socially focused organisation, whose aim is for people to be empowered to live life to the full, maximising their quality of life and independence. Their particular knowledge base is around equipment and adaptations for independent living, including the

use of electronic assistive technology www.goingforindependence.org. To deliver the project the Trust has been supported by a number of friends groups to deliver both indoor and outdoor workshops. For the outdoor workshops/guided walks, members of the friends groups have been providing one to one support and have been given training on how to assist a blind person. They have also been involved in choosing accessible routes for their special visitors. Indoor sessions are used as a way of building up confidence in participants and the friends groups. The autumn session included a visit from foxy (stuffed fox), playing conkers, having a closer look at seeds and fruit, sloe gin tasting and guess the variety of apple.

The project has visited local green spaces for its autumnal walks including Ward Jackson Park, Hartlepool; Linthorpe Cemetery, Middlesbrough; South Park, Darlington; and Errington Woods. All these places are relatively accessible and are havens for wildlife in urban situations and well worth a visit if you are in the area. On the walks the friends groups help to guide their partner. To make the activities more sensory, natural objects are collected, touched, smelt and described. Participants also experience light and shade, walking on different textures and magnifiers are used for looking at smaller objects and species.

At the end of the Errington walk the friends had organised a camp fire and barbeque with sausages and toasted marshmallows. The Countryfile presenter enjoyed this! One of the participants had never had toasted marshmallows before! As well as getting the groups outdoors there is a social side to the activities and this has included: memories being reignited by playing conkers and one lady from Poland learned the game for the first time as it is not a custom in her country.

Many participants don't get out much because of the support they require and definitely don't get out into the wider countryside. From the project we are hoping to gain an insight into how people with low vision are isolated and excluded from activities that others can access and looking at ways to improve this.

The annual BBC Sports Personality of the Year Award event proved to be a good night for cricket, with the England's victorious team at the men's ICC World Cup picking up prizes for team and greatest sporting moment of the year, followed by DCCC's Ben Stokes claiming the main award of the night. In another year with plenty of great contenders, I reckon that all three of those awards were richly deserved, as was the one presented to John Blackie as coach of the year (he has guided world champion sprinter Dina Asher-Smith and many others) and the lifetime achievement recognition that was given to Baroness Tanni Grey-Thompson, yet another local connection. However, probably the most impactful moment of the night was when the amazing Doddie Weir was presented with the Helen Rollason Award. The Rugby union forward was capped 61 times by Scotland and played for the British and Irish Lions, but he won the award for what he has done since being diagnosed with motor neurone disease three years ago, setting up a foundation that has so far raised £5m to fund research into finding a cure for the disease and bringing a lot of attention to the cause in the process. When he accepted the award, Doddie's speech was spine tingling and was in keeping with the man who many in the North East will be familiar with from his time at the Newcastle Falcons (he was part of the team that won the Premiership) and as a regular guest and speaker at events in the region over many years. Doddie is making the absolute most of every day he has left and it was extremely fitting that he was celebrated in this way by the BBC.

Cycling

Cyclo cross returned to Hardwick Park at the end of November, for the eighth year in a row. After several years of good conditions, prolonged rain in the lead-up and on the day made conditions heavy going for riders on the course based in East Park. The small field of Under 12s had the worst of the weather, with Harry Knox of Tyneside Vagabonds narrowly beating Daniel Thompson of Cleveland Wheelers, after swapping



places several times over their nine laps of a shortened course. In the main senior race, with some improvement in the weather, Jon Bailey of Gosforth Road Club led from the start for a comfortable win over eight laps of a 1.2mile course. Among the field of 43 riders were several cyclo cross regulars from Sedgefield, with Chris Dobson finishing the highest up the standings in eighth, while Rob Spink, Mark Bayles and Richard Bayles also rode well. The venue is expected to be used again in 2020 as a round of the North East Cyclo Cross League. For more information on the league visit <u>www.neccl.co.uk</u>.

Athletics

For many runners, the main focus of winter is cross country. Last year the conditions were unusually benign, with a distinct lack of rain, snow, wind and mud at most fixtures. It was said that the biggest queue at the venue for the English National Cross Country Championships near Leeds in February was for the ice cream van! This season is already proving more testing. There was

plenty of rain and mud in Aykley Heads for November's Harrier League event. Runners and club tents at the NE Counties Cross Country Championships in Alnwick in December had to contend with strong, biting winds.

However, none of this was quite as challenging as conditions in Sedgefield for the North Easterns back in 2015, when the snow started falling during the first race and didn't stop all day. No-one involved will forget it and Sedgefield will have another opportunity to host a memorable occasion, as Harriers have just been awarded the the championships in 2020, during the club's 15th birthday year.

The club holds its annual winter handicap race, for the Gerry Kearsley Memorial Trophy on Sunday 19th January, starting and finishing in Bishop Middleham and following a scenic multi -terrain two-lap course of around six miles. The event is for affiliated runners, free to enter, with handicaps based on each runner's best 10K time from the previous 12 months.
