On the Road to Wimbledon



Meet 11 year old Chris Lowe, an up and coming tennis player from Sedgefield Community College, who has made it through to the regional finals of the annual **Road to Wimbledon** competition.

Chris, who is a member of the David Lloyd tennis centre, won the 14 and under category at the tournament hosted by David Lloyds on April 22nd. He won 3 hard-fought matches including a tie-break decider against Hutton Rudby's Harry Dodds and has now qualified for the County finals in June, which will be hosted at Sunderland.

Another win then would see him make it through to competing on the world-famous grass courts at SW19! The event is in its sixth year and is part of the All England Club's community investment scheme, aimed at getting youngsters into tennis.

Chris is now playing for Tennis World in Middlesbrough, a feeder club for County level players, as well as Sedgefield Tennis Club. This in itself is an honour for Chris and a huge stride in the right direction for a boy who has his sights set high. His ambitions are to be a tennis coach and a Wimbledon finalist when he is older. Definitely one to watch!

A truly magnificent Neptune about to regain his rightful place

As the picture shows, the statue of Neptune is almost complete and will soon be ready to be placed on his plinth in the Serpentine River at Hardwick Park.

Since the picture was taken, Neptune's dolphin has been added and the joins between the pieces finished off. The remaining part of the process is the surface 'patination' where the shiny surface is transformed into the dull grey/green effect seen on most bronze statues.

The statue will be unveiled by John Grundy on Thursday 14th June at 11:30am, in a ceremony beside the Serpentine. Also present will be the sculptor, Keith Maddison as well as a Trustee from the Northern Rock Foundation, which funded the project.

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood Watch Shed and Allotment Security Alert!



Many people take a great deal of trouble securing their house and the property within it whilst at the same time leaving valuable property in a shed which is either unlocked or so old and run down that it would prove no obstacle to the thief. During the summer months in our area we see an increase in the number of incidents of thefts from garden sheds.

What can you do?

1. Ensure that your shed is in good condition
2. Fit a good lock on your shed door. The fitting should be bolted through the door of the shed and reinforced at the back with a steel plate. The hasp should have concealed screws or coach bolts fitted. Don't forget the hinges should be secured also with non returnable screws or coach bolts. The padlock itself should not be less than 2.5" in width and made of hardened steel. It should be a closed-shackle type which will reduce the risk of the lock being forced or bolt-cropped.
3. Fit any shed windows with a grill.
4. Security mark property such as lawnmowers, garden furniture etc.
5. Never leave items unattended even if you are just popping into the house. You may only be gone for a minute but they may be gone forever.
6. If you leave items such as pedal cycles in your shed ensure they are security marked and secure them to the superstructure of the building.
7. Install a 'Dusk till Dawn' security light to illuminate your garden. They cost less than a penny a night to run.

Alarms

Readers may well remember from last month's issue that at the April Neighbourhood Watch meeting Crime Prevention Officer Neil Langthorne demonstrated to members a very useful small alarm consisting of a wireless PIR and alarm unit.

These units are very versatile. Not only can they be used as a straight-forward shed alarm: they can be placed inside a car and act as a car alarm (going off inside the house) but they can be set to chime and can be used to detect entry through a door into the house.

Stop Doorstep Crime TRAINING COURSES

Durham County Council Trading Standards Service offer a free training package to try to prevent Doorstep crime. Built around a video for showing to older people, the training package recommends having a presenter (eg carer, volunteer) to engage with the older people, keep their attention and encourage them to get involved as the video is played.

We seek to involve a wide variety of organisations to deliver this material in their own communities.

The aim is to empower older adults to deal effectively with doorstep cold callers.

The package contains background information on distraction burglary and doorstep crime and 2 videos - **BEWARE THE BOGEYMAN**, to show older people what they can do to keep out bogus callers and **BEAT THE BOGEYMAN**, to raise awareness of doorstep crime among professionals and volunteers who work with older people. There are notes to help with presentation of the older people's video, to encourage involvement and improve learning & remembering; and a commentary to run right through the package so the presenter understands the psychological triggers that underpin the package and the importance of sticking to this format.

Training takes approximately one and a half hours and once trained you can train others in your organisation who in turn can give talks to individuals or groups.

The next course is to take place on Friday 15th June from 2 - 4pm in Committee Room 2, County Hall, Durham.

There will be another course on Wednesday 10th October.

Tug of War

The Mediaeval Fayre was graced by Sedgefield's most hotly contested sports event of the year so far. The annual tug of war on the village green was at times titanic, at others controversial, but always entertaining. First up was a contest between the Beavers unit from 1st Sedgefield Scout Group and Sedgefield Youth United, and the advantage gained by pulling down the hill came into play immediately. Winning the toss can be important in a game of cricket, but that's nothing compared to how vital it is at the Mediaeval Fayre tug of war. The captain of the Beavers called correctly and reaped the rewards, as his team was successful in the first 'pull' (is that the technical term?). Sedgefield Youth United levelled the score, but the Beavers took advantage of the slope again to secure a hard fought 2-1 victory. Next up were the Cubs and Brownies. Last year, the Brownies were victorious and the Cubs were determined to make amends. This was a tense, controversial contest. At one point during the three pulls, the Brownies snuck an extra person onto the rope and umpire Peter Hinde was forced to award the contest to the Cubs, who in the end ran out 2-1 victors. Over two years, honours are now even – we could see some real fireworks in 2008.

Then we were treated to a first in Sedgefield. The Girl Guides took on a team of Girl Scouts. This was another hard fought contest, with both sides giving their all. However, the Girl Guides eventually won the day. I have since learnt that this was quite a grudge match, as many of the Girl Scouts apparently used to be Girl Guides and their defection had caused much controversy.

After such a bonanza of entertainment from the younger generation, it was always going to be difficult for the adult tug of war event to match such excitement ...and it didn't. A scratch team from the Round Table was unable to deal with the power and size of Sedgefield Rugby Club, who in turn were soundly beaten by a very effective and experienced team representing Crosshills Hotel. Overall, the tug of war really seemed to grab the imagination of the public and commanded a big crowd. Well done to Peter Hinde for his firm but fair umpiring and

Sedgefield Harriers

Six young Harriers recently took part in a North Yorkshire and South Durham Track and Field League meeting staged at Darlington's Eastbourne Sports Complex. A strong U13 girls' team of JT Fanelli, Cori Sinclair and Abigail Greaves represented the Harriers. JT Fanelli had a successful evening collecting 3 bronze medal positions. These came in the 100m in a time of 15.7 seconds, the long jump with a leap of 3.05m and the shot putt with a put of 5.31m. Meanwhile, Abigail and Cori matched each other throughout the evening recording the same time of

17.5 seconds in the 100m with a photo finish revealing that Abigail had just claimed 4th place ahead of Cori in 5th. It was the same story in the long jump, both girls recording a best leap of 2.23m.

This time Cori claimed the bragging rights to clinch 5th place from Abigail in 6th by virtue of a better 2nd best jump. In the shot putt Cori again finished 5th with a putt of 4.79m whilst Abigail was 6th with a best of 3.98m.

The Harriers' boys were not to be outdone by the girls. Andrew Lawson in his second season with the Harriers recorded a personal best in the U13 age group with 14.5 seconds for the 100m carrying him to 3rd place. Andrew also broke the 6-minute barrier for 1500m for the first time taking 5th place with a time 5.53.7.

Remarkably, as with the U13 girls, the Harriers had two U15 boys that could not be separated on the clock over 100m. In separate races both Jonathan Baines and Jordan Swales recorded a time of 14.9 seconds leaving spectators wondering who might have prevailed had they both been in the same race. Jonathan and Jordan then went on to cap a fine evening's athletics by recording strong personal best performances in the 1500m, registering new marks of 5.04.2 and 5.29.8 respectively. Changes in Local Government

You may recall in the December 2006 edition of Sedgefield News that we published the indicative timetable for consultation on the proposed changes to the structure of local government in County Durham. Presently, County Durham is governed through what is known as the 'two tier system', whereby some services are provided by the County Council and some by the local District or Borough Council.

The consultation exercise is now underway and the Government is asking for the views of key stakeholders about the pro's and con's of abolishing the seven District /Borough Councils and the County Council, and establishing one Council to cover the whole of the County.

The Government's Tests are:

Affordability, Support, Strong, effective and accountable leadership, Neighbourhood empowerment and Value for Money. These have been considered in the Governments' preliminary views in support of a single authority.

The County Council proposal can be viewed by visiting their website on www.durham.gov.uk. A big green idea - on May 1st, a town called Modbury, in Devon officially became the first town in the British Isles to stop issuing plastic shopping bags when goods are purchased.

Traders in Modbury have joined together with residents and business organisations to try to make sure that from now on there will not be a single plastic shopping bag available in the entire town. Here are just a few of the facts about plastic that inspired their action.

A plastic bag can take between 500 to 1000 years to break down.

In the UK at least 200 million plastic bags end up as litter on beaches, streets and parks every year. Much of that litter enters the sea.

Many marine animals mistake plastic bags for food and swallow them, with painful and often fatal consequences. An estimated 1 million seabirds choke or get tangled in plastic nets or other debris every year.

We can all help by carrying a shopping bag or basket, or MAYBE EVEN RESURRECTING THE DREADED SHOPPING TROLLEY! But could our Sedgefield traders help us jump on the Modbury bandwagon? Let's ask the Co-op, which prides itself on its ethics, and Sainsbury's; they have had a trial attempt in some of their big shops so why not Sainsbury's at Bells? And - let's give credit where it's due - Selections and many other shops give us *paper* bags, if we need one.

"Marley and Me" by John Grogan has a cover which must surely attract any dog-lover, particularly one who has or has had a quizzical golden Labrador pup. There is something about that expression which says "look at me", or in this case, "read me"!

John Grogan is an award-winning journalist and the Pennsylvania columnist for the Philadelphia Inquirer. Marley was his dog and this is the story of their relationship, of Marley growing up with Grogan and his wife, and throughout the births of their children; of city life and country life, but primarily of the effect a dog has on its owners.

It is an easily read book which describes a "mad" dog whose antics are incredible and yet who wins hearts and is devoted to his family from beginning to end. This is not a classic! It is a gentle, tender account which made my husband smile and say "You should read it - you'll really enjoy it!" I did, thoroughly. I found "Marley and Me" humorous and poignant; I laughed and I shed a tear at its inevitable conclusion; a lovely, simple story of a good man, his family and Marley. *MM*


