Something old....

The remaining original gate of Hardwick Hall is to be re-erected at its original location.

The Friends of Hardwick charity gained planning permission to install the gate on Durham Road adjacent to the bus shelter between West Park Lane and Hardwick Road where part of the original park wall still stands. The gate would mark the historic eastern access point of the park from Sedgefield village.

The project, led by the Friends of Hardwick charity, is a restoration effort designed to reinforce the historic link between Sedgefield and Hardwick Park. It builds on the charity's previous activities for the restoration of Hardwick Park 20 years ago, and the installation of the replica of the lost statue of Neptune in the Serpentine Lake.

The original main gates to Hardwick Hall were removed during the construction of the Hardwick Road estate. One of these gates was lost after being used as the pattern for the modern gates on the A177 park entrance, while the remaining one has been in storage.


A new play attraction

standing almost 15 metres tall is to be installed in Hardwick Park. Durham County Council has been making improvements to Hardwick Park's play area as part of a scheme to redevelop its play facilities. The work includes installing a brandnew play area which features a zip line; basket swing; hammocks; accessible roundabout and outdoor musical instruments.

In addition to this new equipment, a giant play tower will also be installed as part of the improvements. Only the second of its kind in Europe, the tower is coming all the way from Germany and will be similar to its twin found in Bietigheim-Bissingen, near Stuttgart.

Standing at 14.5 metres, the tower has been designed to complement the park's gothic gatehouse and tower, designed by architect James Paine in the 18th Century.

Standing 2.25 metres high and 1.565 metres wide, the gate will be mounted on a steel display structure with a plaque providing historical context and will be accessible from the footpath.

Friends of Hardwick say the initiative will "return a piece of Sedgefield history to visibility" and "provide an additional historic feature in Sedgefield". The charity is currently undertaking the final fundraising for the project. The Friends of Hardwick would like to acknowledge the help and support of the Durham Council Area Action Partnership and our local councillors Chris Lines and David Brown. It will boast rope chimneys; a net bridge; slides and a range of sensory play elements. Children will also be able to enjoy enviable views over the park from the viewing platform. The play area near the Gothic Tower at Hardwick Park is currently closed while work to install the tower and new elements is carried out. The full new play area is expected to open in the spring.

Skill Builder

For this month's article about life at SCC, we'd like to share some

information about 'Skills Builder' – an approach that we've introduced to our school this year that supports our students to develop 8 vital skills that will help them to achieve success here and for the rest of their lives.



The 'Skills Builder Universal Framework' is a tool that is widely used around the world by many schools and businesses. It breaks down the development of skills into a series of stages. Through this approach, it supports children and adults to build their confidence and ability to demonstrate each skill. At SCC, we have focused on a number of priority skills since September and

these are: 'Staying Positive', 'Speaking' and 'Listening'. Within school, we look for as many opportunities as possible to promote these skills in assemblies and across all subject lessons. We also aim to create as many opportunities as possible for our children to put these skills into practice through educational visits or inviting guests into school. For example, the Kingswood residential visit for the vast majority of our Year 7 students to take part in outdoor activities was a chance to develop the ability to 'Stay Positive'!

Lots of our students have made brilliant progress in developing our priority skills so far this year and we're looking forward to developing our school rewards systems in the coming months to recognise their excellent work!



Parking around our school

At Sedgefield Hardwick Primary Academy, we believe that the parking around our school could be improved. To do this, the Year 4 pupils are working with Sophie McMullen, a Police Community Support Officer, to implement this as part of their Community Impact Offer. The pupils conducted a walk around the grounds outside of our school to check for examples of inconsiderate parking on the morning of Friday 14 February 2025 at 8:30am. "We saw some examples where parking could be improved. We hope that our work will make people think about their parking choices," explained a pupil from Year 4.



After assessing the parking and taking photographs of any areas to improve, the children will be making an informative video to show parents how parking could be better. This video will be posted on the school's social media pages to appeal to as wide an audience as possible.

In March, the pupils will repeat the process, with an observation of parking around the school, to assess the impact of their efforts. They will also be putting up posters on the school gates to promote better parking choices. It is hoped that parking around our school will improve and that road users will continue to be more thoughtful about parking near our school so that everyone can stay safe.

Formerly part of 'Durham County Lunatic Asylum', Skerne Wood lies at the north end of Sedgefield NETPark and is managed as a Community Woodland by local volunteers. At first glance, it looks unremarkable; a linear strip of marginal grassland, hedgerows and wooded fragments heavily used by dogwalkers and bounded by farmland, industrial development and housing, the type of 'scrub' habitat commonly found 'A tiny piece in the jigsaw: What Skerne Wood's birds tell us about marginal sites' – A talk by Dr Fred Milton.



across the County. A four year survey at Skerne Wood shows that it is home to 140 pairs of birds, including many red-listed species. Beginning with a social history of the site, this talk will demonstrate how such sites are essential and should be valued.

A few volunteers from the Woodland & Wildlife Project headed to the Durham Group of RSPB to listen to Fred's interesting talk about our project site, Skerne Wood. Fred is a regular volunteer with the project and carries out a dawn bird survey annually, visiting the site every 10 days between March and June come rain or shine! The work Fred carries out gives us a valuable picture of the bird species using Skerne Wood and how it compares to UK trends.

Fred has kindly offered to deliver his entertaining talk in Sedgefield, so look out for further details in Sedgefield News and on social media, all will be welcome! Owning and managing 50 nature reserves throughout the North East, they focus on work to restore Durham's threatened habitats and species, and reconnect people with the natural world around them. STEVE'S NATURE DIARY MARCH 2025

Have you ever wondered where all the spiders go during the colder months? You might think they're all inside your house – but the truth is, they have other strategies up their eight sleeves.

Rather than darting around in your house, most spiders that actually survive the winter choose to shelter outdoors instead. They look for a quiet spot in an outbuilding – or a natural shelter such as under logs or stones, in leaf litter or hollow plant stems – where they're not going to be disturbed by you. This is one reason why it's really important that we don't tidy up too much in the garden, because this can deprive those spiders of cosy spots to see out the cold weather.

Most spiders mate in the late summer or early autumn. After the females lay their eggs, they often die and leave the eggs somewhere sheltered, and wrapped in spider silk. Some species will stay with their egg sac to help keep the eggs warm, as long as they can and increase the likelihood of the eggs surviving to hatch in the spring. Some species get through the cold season in a pretty amazing way: as the temperature drops, they develop enzymes in their blood that act like antifreeze, and then enter a state called diapause where their metabolism slows right down, and they use barely any energy. There are some spiders that simply avoid outdoors altogether. Giant house spiders - the big dark ones you see in the bathtub – simply live in our houses all year-round. They're apparently getting more active in winter in recent years - maybe due to climate change, or perhaps just because we're keeping our houses warmer.

One species of spider which is being seen more often in people's houses is the Cellar Spider or Daddy-Longlegs Spider as it is often called. It is an invasive species originally from the sub-tropics; it arrived in numbers in the UK in the 1930s, inhabiting buildings in the extreme south of England. Being from warmer climes it does not survive our colder environment and as a result inhabits houses and outbuildings that are protected from low temperatures. Of late they have spread throughout England and Wales and even apparently, into parts of Scotland, fuelled, no doubt, by the advent of central heating. When disturbed the spider, which hangs below an untidy silken mass, vibrates the structure (and itself) rapidly in an effort to confuse an attacker. Any further threat and the spider lets go of its home, drops away and scurries rapidly over whatever surface it lands on. They will tackle a range of prey including wasps and bees and anything that gets too close. During daylight hours they seem to prefer to be tucked away in a crack, crevice or corner and remain there until a prey item blunders into the web or it becomes dark, at which latter event they venture forth and, suspended beneath their hammocks, await the arrival of supper. So, keep your eye out when you are dusting and please don't disturb!






parkrun celebrations

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
