The natural world month by month

May

I am sure you will be pleased to know that on my fifth attempt I managed to catch up with the rare bird – the Penduline Tit which I mentioned in last month's column. It was only a brief glimpse and through a telescope but it was worth it.

In May it is well worth having a closer look at hedgerows, they are bursting with life. The white flowers of Blackthorn are starting to fade and these are replaced with Hawthorn blossom also known as May and is the only British tree to be named after the month in which it blooms. Hawthorn blossom was a key part of the May Day celebrations and was the original confetti as it was traditional to get married in the spring. The plant also had many medicinal uses, especially for heart conditions. Its name comes from the Old English 'haeg' meaning hedge.

Common Hawthorn can support more than 300 insects. It is the food plant for caterpillars of many moths, including the hawthorn, orchard ermine, vapourer, small eggar and lappet moths. The flowers are eaten by dormice and provide nectar and pollen for bees and other pollinating insects. The haws are rich in antioxidants and are eaten by many migrating birds such as redwings, fieldfares and thrushes, as well as small mammals. The dense thorny foliage makes fantastic nesting shelter for many species of bird. In Britain it was believed that bringing Hawthorn blossom into the house would be followed by illness and death, and in medieval times it was said that Hawthorn blossom smelled like the Great Plague. Botanists later learned that the chemical trimethylamine in Hawthorn blossom is also one of the first chemicals formed in decaying animal tissue, so it is not surprising that Hawthorn flowers are associated with death.

Hedgerows are listed as a priority habitat in the UK Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP). This means that they have been identified as an important habitat and actions are being taken to increase the quantity and quality of hedges in the UK, so that they continue to support a wealth of wildlife. Hedgerows provide vital resources for mammals, birds, and insects. They also act as wildlife corridors, allowing species to move between isolated habitats.

About 130 BAP priority species are significantly associated with hedgerows – these include moths, birds, lichens and fungi. While few of these species are dependent on hedgerows alone, the loss of hedgerows, or a decline in their quality, would be likely to have an adverse effect on their populations. Since the Second World War, the UK's ancient hedgerows have dramatically declined due to removal to increase field size and to make way for development. By the 1990s, 121,000 km of hedgerows had been lost across the UK. So why not plant your own native hedge and make a positive contribution to helping these species? Notes from the Neighbourhood Watch Meeting, April 12th

The Durham County Council Highways Committee deferred an application for the approval of parking restrictions on the access road into the Trading Estate due to a late objection. The application will now be presented to the May Highways Committee meeting.

PC Keith Todd informed the meeting of two egg throwing incidents from a moving vehicle and appealed for any information that might be helpful in his enquiries. He did, however, also report that recorded incidents of Anti-Social Behaviour in the last two months was at an all-time low.

The meeting was informed that a replacement for Lauren Wray (Community Liaison Officer) has not yet been actioned.

cracking down on speeding motorists saw 'night vision' safety cameras being used to identify offenders last month. These new infra red cameras can be used in low light levels and have been fitted to the four mobile safety vans which operate across the Durham and Cleveland force areas. The new cameras replace the previous models which could only operate when there was sufficient daylight to capture vehicle registration details to the required level. Acting Inspector Phil Grieve, from the CDSOU said; "This new, night time capability means the staff from the Safety Camera Unit can now operate at any time of day or night and detect speeding motorists at times the older

This type of behaviour will not be tolerated in member premises and action will be taken against offenders.

equipment could not.

He continued, "Speeding remains one of the four main factors in serious or fatal collisions and the limits are put in place quite simply to protect pedestrians and all road-users."

Road Traffic Accident data suggests that nine out of ten pedestrians will survive if hit by a vehicle at 20mph. However, this figure falls to five out of ten when struck at 30mph, and only one in ten at a speed of 40mph. In the recent trial, on the A66 near Teesside Retail Park, one offending driver was clocked at 79mph in the 50mph limit. Acting Inspector Grieve added: "We want people to drive in a way that they would expect others to drive."
