New head oversees big changes at college

Sedgefield Community College's new head teacher David Davies. has high hopes for the future, as work begins to replace the building with smart new premises. Having started working life as a production engineer for Coles Cranes in Sunderland, Mr Davies decided teaching was what he really wanted to do. He trained at Sunderland University, taught technology in Washington for ten vears, and later became Head of Faculty at Easington, then Deputy Head of Sandhill View School in Sunderland.

As head teacher here he likes to keep in close contact with pupils, and is keen to ensure that they all have the richest possible experience, encouraging aspiration, achievement and high expectations. "We intend to offer a wide range of opportunities, so that all our pupils feel valued and enjoy their time in school" he said. Since arriving in February, Mr Davies has made 15 new appointments, including two new deputy head teachers and heads of maths, science and creative arts. He aims to develop the ethos and culture of the school, so that high expectations lead to improved aspirations. He intends to develop communication and links with the community as well as consulting with pupils, parents and governors over developments within school With completion expected in January 2011, the new building will

enhance the learning experience of Sedgefield students for years to come. But Mr Davies is very aware of the needs of those pupils in Years 10 and 11 who will leave school before then. "We must and will ensure that those students have the best possible support and encouragement at this vital time in their school career." Work on the new building is being overseen by Deputy Head John Tomlinson, seconded to work with construction company Carillion. Part of the government scheme Building Schools for the Future, Sedaefield is in the first wave, five to ten years ahead of other schools. Teaching and learning in the new building will be transformed by state of the art technology, such as interactive white boards, laptops, hand-held devices, digital resources and video conferencing. There will also be outstanding provision for sports and performing arts. The whole building will be light, open and airy, with improved access and parking for the large number of students arriving by bus. A private sector partner will be responsible for maintenance, caretaking, cleaning and security, freeing up academic staff to concentrate on teaching. Mr Davies predicts a bright future for Sedgefield Community College. He has already found parents extremely supportive, with an 80% turnout at his first parents' night, and considers the pupils some of the best he has ever worked with.



The new pastoral structure, with two Kev Stage coordinators and three newly appointed year managers, provides an excellent support system, tracking progress, encouraging learning, developing social skills, promoting extracurricular activities and ensuring efficient communication with parents. "We're just at the beginning of the journey," says Mr. Davies. "Together we can move forward in the way we think and work, providing a 1st class education fit for the 21st century." Sedgefield Neighbourhood Watch Dark Nights – Security Concerns

With the dark nights just round the corner, comes the Burglar & Sneak Thief's greatest opportunity. Take the time and trouble to help yourself minimise the risk of providing them with an "early Xmas Bonus":-

Don't leave your house unlit after dark. Use light timers and draw curtains. Don't leave valuable or desirable items on show.

Lock your doors even when you are at home.

Don't leave your keys (this includes your car keys) where a thief can see them or where they can be hooked and retrieved via the letterbox.

Tell a "trusted" neighbour of any extended periods of absence and ask for their help to push all letters and papers **fully** through the letterbox (& why not complain to the culprits who leave stuff sticking out in the first place?). Better still if you have a trusted neighbour ask them to draw curtains, remove mail / newspapers out of site and generally keep an eye on your home whilst you are away.

Report any suspicious persons or out of place vehicles to the Police 0345 60 60 365, the Police **want** us to do this, as it is a major source of crime detection, as well as crime prevention.

Door Bars are a simple and effective deterrent to the sneak thief or unwelcome visitor; these are available from our local Community Warden **Tim Spearey** who will also fit same if required (contact Tim see phone details below or you can contact N/Hood Watch C/man **Ken Saiger** on **621896**).

Visible burglar alarms make burglars think twice and usually they go elsewhere, similarly good exterior lighting usually deters thieves; for advice on these items and other security aspects contact **Keith Lounds** our local Crime Prevention Officer on **01325 742714**.

Clean heat for Sedgefield Police Station

The upgrade which is causing the temporary closure of the Police Station will include a complete refurbishment of the internal areas to comply with accessibility requirements, as well as an experimental "free" central heating system. Engineers will scrap the traditional gas boiler and tap into the natural heat source below ground. Coils of plastic piping containing a special liquid will soak up the heat and be pumped back to the surface and transferred to radiators throughout the building, providing a comfortable working environment of at least 20^c.

Jottings from the September meeting

Although attendance was lower than usual, it was a good meeting. Just to remind residents of the message boxes in the Library and Town Council Office where suggestions or issues for concern can be deposited. The Forum and the Neighbourhood Watch meetings which also include the Police PACT programme are venues for this type of exchange and the boxes were established as an additional means for residents to express themselves. Authorities including Police are trying all ways to get feedback and information from our community on issues people want addressing so please make use of them. Complaints about noise nuisance need to be reported to DCC Environment Officer.

Residents commented on the upgrading of paving in surrounding villages compared with the appalling condition of those in Sedgefield and urged the Town Council to pursue this via DCC

The issue of wind turbines was raised. The anemometer at Foxton has received planning approval but DCC is reported to be consulting with Arup (an independent firm of designers, planners, engineers, consultants and technical specialists) regarding an agreed future strategy for further wind farm applications.

An unexpected injection of funds for Hardwick Country Park gave hope for an abandonment of parking charges.

There was much appreciation expressed for the work of the Council gardeners, including weed clearance in specific areas. Farewell to a great summer of sport, especially if you're a cricket fan in North East England. As I wrote last month's sports update, I was contemplating a day at the Oval during the last Ashes Test. It was a privilege to be there as England edged towards victory. I wasn't there for the finale, but of course England managed to secure the right result. This latest home series may not have had the quality or nail biting intensity of its predecessor in 2005, but it was consistently entertaining and England just about edged the contest (in sharp contrast to the One Day International series, but we'll conveniently forget that). With my family, I was able to get along to the Riverside to see Durham wrap up the title with another comprehensive victory, over their nearest 'challengers', Nottinghamshire. It was a great afternoon. The club offered free entry to everyone, the sun shone throughout and Steve 'Grievous Bodily' Harmison fittingly took the final Notts wicket just after the tea break. Cue a formal presentation of the trophy and great celebrations in front of the main stand. The club can now also celebrate being awarded an Ashes Test for 2013, which is fantastic news. In my opinion, it will be four years overdue as the Riverside should have hosted a match this year rather than Cardiff (though to be fair, the Swalec Stadium did stage a great Test). Nevertheless, this is very exciting and by the time we get to 2013, the Riverside will have been further developed into what I am sure will be an even more outstanding 20,000 capacity ground. I can't wait.

Fire Station Success

Four years ago Durham County Fire & Rescue started an annual Extrication Competition, to promote new skills and practice among the service and to show the public what happens during a rescue from the result of a road traffic collision. This competition is open to whole time and retained stations across the county. Sedgefield Fire Station won for the third time at The Great Aycliffe Show in August. The competition involves a staged rescue of a casualty from a crashed car, observed and marked by assessors from United Kingdom Rescue Organisation. 20 minutes are allowed to safely remove the stabilised casualty from the car and the judges assess casualty care, command & control, and technical methods of each team. Sedgefield gained first place, for the second year running, for Incident Command, Casualty Care and Technical. Sure Start funding decisions force closure of local nursery

After caring for children within Fishburn and the surrounding community for six and a half years I am sorry to announce that Bright Buttons nursery has had to close, with the loss of seven jobs. After being lottery funded through the Neighbourhood nursery government scheme in 2003, the government have now awarded further lottery funding to the House Of Eden to provide the same facilities less than half a mile away.

In the last three years the market has been flooded with Sure Start provision and as there are only so many children within the County, many private nurseries are being seriously affected.

As director, I applied to Sure Start for sustainability funding, was awarded funding for 2008/2009 but refused any more for April 2009. Bright Buttons was the only day-care setting refused sustainability funding and also a capital grant which all settings received to buy new equipment at a crucial time when the new setting opened close by. Both of these grants continue to be available to all of the other settings in the County.

I am very dismayed as to the mismanagement of money within the Sure Start organisation and although I have been advised to seek legal help the nursery is now out of business and indeed money to fund advice.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the families who have supported Bright Buttons and I am very sorry that I have had no other option than to cease to trade.
