Operation Close Pass: Overtaking Cyclists at a Safe Distance

A new police operation educates drivers

A plain-clothed officer cycling on the A177 from Shincliffe towards Durham City has identified motorists as passing too close. They were then intercepted and educated by emergency services.

Inspector Jon Curtis of Cleveland and Durham Specialist Operations Unit, who headed up Operation Close Pass, said: "We know that a number of cyclists feel unsafe by the way some motorists pass them. This led us to proactively identify and educate drivers who pass too closely to cyclists. We want to remind drivers to allow a safe passing distance of 1.5 metres when overtaking. I think that today has been a stark reminder to these drivers of the risks involved."

County Durham & Darlington Fire and Rescue Service used a 'close pass mat' to help

educate drivers. Pictured here, the mat shows drivers exactly how much space cyclists should be given when being overtaken by a vehicle. Durham County Council used virtual reality goggles to simulate a car crash to show the devastation distractions can cause. If drivers did not want



to be educated, they faced a £100 fine and 3 points on their licence or up to a £5,000 fine and potential disqualification if prosecuted at court for careless driving. Insp Curtis said:

"Cyclists are vulnerable road users so it is important that drivers recognise the importance of giving them sufficient space on the roads. Passing cyclists too closely puts all road users in danger. You should allow at least as much room as you would when overtaking a car, when passing a person on a bicycle, giving consideration to the maximum speed limit and time and distance available to you."

With so many cyclists in and around Sedgefield, please do remember to overtake at a safe distance.

Skerne Medical Group - Flu Campaign 2018

The ever popular flu vaccination "drop in" clinics are returning and we would like to invite and encourage eligible patients to attend. Clinics run on the following mornings between 8:30am and 11:30am

Saturday 15th September at Harbinson House, Sedgefield <u>and</u> Carroll House, Trimdon Colliery <u>and</u> Beveridge House, Fishburn

Saturday 13th October at Harbinson House, Sedgefield

The free flu vaccination is available to patients who are 65 years and over (including those becoming age 65 years by 31st March 2019), pregnant women and patients aged from 6 months to less than 65 years of age with a serious medical condition such as; chronic (long term) respiratory disease, e.g. severe asthma, COPD or bronchitis; chronic heart disease, chronic liver disease, chronic kidney disease at stage three, four or five, chronic neurological disease such as motor neurone disease or Parkinson's disease or learning disability; diabetes; splenic dysfunction, those patients with a weakened immune system due to disease or treatment; people living in long stay residential care home and carers.

No appointment is necessary and we aim to make it a quick & efficient experience. We're proud to say been no long queues at these sessions over the past 3 years. If you haven't attended the "drop in" before, why not give it a try. We look forward to welcoming you.

We are also able to extend the seasonal influenza programme to all children aged 2 and 3 (but not 4 years or older) on 31 August 2018 (i.e. date of birth on or after 1 Sept 2014 and on or before 31 August 2016). Sessions are planned later in October, once the vaccine is made available – details will be advertised locally, on our website <u>www.doctorsnhs.co.uk</u> and in surgeries.

The vaccine available to children, unless contraindicated, is in the form of a nasal spray rather than an injection, which we are sure will please the children!

"The unremembered"

This is the name of a research programme currently being undertaken by the Government, to commemorate the work of the men and women of the Labour Corps in the First World War. Many of those who served were men

considered unsuitable for combat. Many died, but their contributions, carrying, building, washing, cleaning, cooking - are rarely acknowledged today. In many respects the Labour Corps were treated as second class servicemen by the British Army and little has been written about them in

the century since the end of the conflict. Work ranged from railway construction to battlefield salvage, burial of the dead to running baths and de-lousing facilities, guarding prisoners

of war to forestry and farming. I have decided, as part of my Duke of Edinburgh award to research people

from Sedgefield and surrounding communities who may have been part of the British Labour Corps, which was restructured in January 1917 to meet the demands of the unprecedented scale of the First World War. All of the research gathered will be provided to the National Project to be published to recognise the important contribution and help share an understanding of their experiences.

I would therefore be grateful if you could publish my letter as a call for information from anyone which helps to tell the story of the experiences of their friends and families who were part of the Labour Corps. This could be anything from people sharing memories passed on, letter exchanges between service personnel, archive images, newspaper articles, poetry or songs; anything that helps to paint the picture of the people involved so we can understand the situations they experienced. *Seren Williams (Age 14)* Please email information to

Letter from PC Lamb

Given my role the first order of business was to ask residents what was important to them. Two issues became immediately apparent, the first being that people are weary of anti-social behaviour of a weekend evening. We began work earlier in the summer to address this and in terms of the issues being experienced by many of you things have improved significantly. I must say that most of our young people are polite and a joy to speak with, it's just a question of finding out who is not and why.

Once we introduced measures to address the issue some argued that police should focus their attention on 'more important' matters, although it is probably fair to say that those voicing such concerns might have thought differently if they were affected themselves. For now the anti-social behaviour measures are staying with us and I would urge parents not to allow your underage children out of the house either with alcohol or after they have consumed it. It is often said of late that the problem is with visitors and not those local to Sedgefield, but I've been out there every weekend and it's both.

Simply put, if you're underage and walking around with alcohol or under the influence don't expect the police to leave you alone. Parents, please intervene if your children are coming home inebriated or you find that alcohol is missing from the house. We're not trying to get people into trouble, the measures are to protect everyone (not least the young people themselves).

The second issue people were keen to discuss with me is the distribution of drugs in the village. Work is underway to identify who might be bringing drugs into the towns' pubs, and where we find it police will seek a prosecution in every case. Those who use it, do be aware we are looking to identify where you deal or buy, where you live, who you associate with and the vehicles you use.

I am keen to establish a larger network of Neighbourhood Watch; such schemes have been proven effective and you can make reports anonymously. It's just a matter of people working together to keep each other safe, that's all it's about. A few seconds attention really does make a difference - anyone

interested in being part of the scheme please feel free to contact me. I would urge everyone to pay attention to what's happening outside, and if you see anything you would like to report please provide as detailed a description as you can of any suspects, in particular clothing and direction of travel. And if you would rather a police car did not attend your house that's no problem, just let us know. If we all work together we can change more than you think. Enjoy the summer, stay safe everyone. *John.*

Commemoration

The constant heat and sunshine of recent weeks broke dramatically on July 27th, when a hardy band sheltered beneath St Edmund's lych gate to commemorate another Sedgefield man lost in the Great War 100 years ago. William Henry Bungay died in France on Saturday July 27th



1918, aged 34. Commemorated at Le Quesnoy Communal Cemetery in Northern France, near Le Cateaux on the Somme, Private Bungay served with the 13th Battalion Yorkshire Hussars (Princess Alexandra's Own Yorkshire Regiment), more familiar now as the Green Howards.

An only child, William was born in Staindrop in 1884 to James and Elizabeth Bungay. The family was still living there in 1891, but by 1901, when William was 17, he and his father had moved to Sadberge. In 1907, William married a Sedgefield girl, Esther Sayers, three years older than him, who came from a big family with seven children. Father was a joiner, two of his sons apprenticed.

By 1911, William was working as a gardener, living with Esther in Hardwick Gardens. After the war, Esther lived in West End and later in Station Road. For 50 years, she was organist at the Methodist Church (now the Scout Hall), where her husband had been choirmaster. After his death, a new pipe organ was bought for the church, bearing a plaque in memory of Private WH Bungay. Unveiled at a ceremony in 1921, a coffee supper held afterwards raised the full cost of the organ - £70. Plaques were also placed in memory of George Henry Willans and William Brumpton, who both lost their lives in action in 1916.

Esther Bungay never re-married and, as far as we know, there were no children. She lived on until 1970, dying aged 89, a widow for 52 years. We remember her loss and honour the memory of her husband William Henry Bungay with gratitude and pride. On August 25th, Sedgefield LHS and the Village Veterans commemorated Sergeant Ralph John Case of the 7th Battalion Lincolnshire Regiment. (To be reported in September's edition.)

October sees two more commemorations: William Henry Todd (Wednesday 3rd) and Alfred Coates (Tuesday 23rd), both of the East Yorkshire Regiment. Please join us (10.45 am at the war memorial) to remember those Sedgefield men we lost in the Great War. As the 100th anniversary of World War I draws to a close, Sedgefield LHS will present an exhibition 'In Memoriam' in Ceddesfeld Hall over the weekend of November 17-18. More details soon.

DCC will consult communities again (probably next year) on their final preferred options having considered the responses to this consultation; however, we would hope to have some feedback and answers to questions from DCC before then.

There should also be an update on our Sedgefield Neighbourhood Plan from the Town Council in September. Our village is still under threat from further developers despite things 'going quiet' for the moment.
