Celebrating 120 years of sporting success

Three of Sedgefield's successful sports clubs are celebrating major anniversaries in 2025, and each of them has a great and distinct story to tell.

Founded by Alan Hall in the same year that The Beatles released Rubber Soul and Help!, Sedgefield St Edmund's Football Club is 60 years old this year. Sedgefield District Rugby Union Football Club was formed by student nurses from Winterton Hospital in the same year as Live Aid and is still rocking all over the North East at 40. Sticking with the musical references, not long after the Live 8 concert in 2005, an invitation to go for a run was printed in Sedgefield News, which turned out to be the genesis of Sedgefield Harriers, now 20.

We asked the three clubs to give Sedgefield News an insight into their origins, key moments from their history, and aspirations for the future. They all delivered loads of great material – in fact, we've got far too much to include here! However, none of it is going to waste. A Capital Experience



In June, Year 6 pupils from Sedgefield Hardwick Primary Academy set off on an exciting four-day residential trip to London, creating memories that will last a lifetime. The whole residential was fully funded by the Laidlaw School Trust, ensuring that all pupils had access to this extraordinary experience!

The journey began with a bus ride to the capital, where the group stayed at a YHA hostel that quickly became their base for adventure. The first stop was nothing short of magical the Harry Potter Studio Tour, where pupils explored iconic sets, props, and costumes from the worldfamous films.

Team Sedgefield

Throughout each school year, there are always many events and successes for the students who represent 'Team Sedgefield' and demonstrate their considerable sporting skills. Amongst the successes in the summer term, it was a wonderful achievement for our Year 7 football team to complete a league and cup double in their first year at the school!



As well as footballing success, 'Team Sedgefield' also performed brilliantly in the SWDSAA District and Athletics Championships that took place in the summer term. Our Year 7 boys, Year 8 boys, Year 10 boys and Year 10 girls all came second in their competitions.

Impressively, we also had no fewer than 11 of our students who qualified for the County Championships across a wide range of disciplines including 100m, 200m, 800m and a range of field events too. A special mention should also be made of our school dodgeball team who qualified for the national finals that took place in Stoke - a great achievement!

We have many students who represent SCC with distinction across multiple sports and, in order to recognise this, 41 students were awarded a Skills Builder Teamwork or Leadership badge in an assembly at the end of the school year.

All of the children nominated by our PE team have shown exceptional teamwork or leadership skills and they are now able to celebrate this and wear their reward badge with pride.



Day two was packed with some of London's most famous landmarks. Pupils visited St Paul's Cathedral before heading to Buckingham Palace to watch the Changing of the Guard. The day ended on a high with a trip to the West End to watch a dazzling performance of Matilda the Musical, which had everyone singing

British Air Racing

The Royal Aero Club Records, Racing and Rally Association returned to North East England on the weekend of the 26 and 27 July when Fishburn Airfield hosted a series of air races for the organisation.



The air races are handicap events where pilots launch into the race at a specific time, depending on the maximum speed of the aircraft that they fly. Slower aircraft launch first while the faster take off later. The pilots then navigate around up to five laps of a pre-determined course before crossing a finish line. The first aircraft to cross the finish line is the winner of the race. The handicap start is designed to ensure that piloting and navigational skill are the decisive factors in the race, not pure aircraft speed.

Discussing the skill involved in the race, Ben Polwin, the pilot of aircraft number 777 said, "The difference between winning and losing a race can be down to the smallest error. We need to visually acquire the turning points and try to pass them with a lateral separation of less than 10 meters." Ben, a Royal Air Force Typhoon pilot, hand built his aircraft and won the coveted Schnieder Trophy in the 2024 air race season.

Before each race, a detailed briefing was given by Race Director Dan Pangbourne to the air race crews. This briefing covered the course to be flown, noise sensitive local areas that should not be overflown, and actions to be carried out in the event of an airborne emergency.

For the duration of the practise session on Saturday morning and the two races carried out on Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning, the airspace that the race was flown in was closed to other aircraft to ensure the race could be accomplished safely.

The owner of Fishburn Airfield, David Morgan, said, "It was fantastic to host the Royal Aero Club again at Fishburn Airfield this weekend. The races were professionally planned and flown, and it was superb to see the new owners of the Flight Ranch open their doors to host the huge number of our local community who visited the airfield to watch the racers."

For members of Sedgefield and District u3a, retirement doesn't signal the need to sit quietly at home wondering what life has come to. Our photographers are out and about, putting their newfound skills to the test, the Lunch Group continue to meet monthly in their friendly social group to visit a wide range of local eateries, we visit theatres and performance spaces across the region to see and hear exceptional drama, exuberant musicals, and perfect music. We marvel at wonderful gardens and beautiful historic houses, our scribes continue to extend their repertoire of writing styles and the Book Group explore different genres of others' writing. Our monthly meeting is when we gather to listen to an interesting speaker and have the opportunity to catch up over a coffee and to see what other members and their groups have organised for the next few weeks.

Most of our groups meet in either Ceddesfeld Hall or the Parish Hall. However, some of the groups meet in a member's home and, because of space constrictions, these are limited to approximately 12 members. One such group is the WAG - Wine Appreciation Group. We generally compare and contrast 4 or 5 wines, usually two white and two red, and enjoy a selection of complementary nibbles. We are not at all pretentious or faux knowledgeable but we like to think that we have all learned and now appreciate the varying types, styles and genres of mid-range wines. Another popular group is the Science, Technology and Industry group. They visit a wide variety of factories, plants and scientific or technology sites. Later in September we will be visiting the Formica factory on South Tyneside.

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY SEPTEMBER 2025

I was going to write about a totally different subject when I sat down, but I was distracted by our House Martins who are still visiting the nest outside my window, bringing insects to their second brood. Sometimes three or four birds are seen visiting the nest, so I can only assume the first brood is now old



enough to feed themselves and are helping the parents. House Martins arrive here in April and can still be seen in September before they migrate back to Africa. The House Martin is glossy black above, completely white below, and has a white rump and a short, forked tail. It builds mud nests, sometimes in small colonies, under ledges, on cliffs and, as their name suggests, under the eaves of houses.

But I digress, back to my subject this month - one of the activities which is popular with a number of groups I work with is the museum of the strange - a collection of all sorts ranging from skulls and bone to poo and owl pellets. There is always one object that confuses most people when they are trying to guess what it is. They are round, brown balls with a diameter of around 1-2cm, sometimes with a very small hole in them and attached to either a branch or a twig. Any thoughts?



That's right, they are plant galls - in this case Oak Marble Galls. But what is a gall? A gall is defined as a growth on a plant that is made of plant tissue but caused by another organism. These organisms might be insects, bacteria, fungi or viruses. Insect galls are the most common.

All galls are formed for the same sort of purpose: the deformity is a deliberate mechanism by the gall causer to use the plant for its own purposes. In ecological terms, it's known as a parasitic relationship. The gall causer manipulates the plant tissue for itself, but the plant receives no benefits in exchange. Most galls don't harm the plant, though, and will have no effect on the health of the host trees.

Back to Oak Marble Galls. This is one of our most well-known galls. It occurs on both our native oak species, as well as other oak species, and can be found across the UK. It's caused by a gall wasp, Biorhiza pallida. The wasp lays her eggs inside a dormant leaf bud. The eggs hatch in spring and start the process for the formation of galls. These galls tend to drop from the trees in June, when the larvae are mature and ready to fly. However, some remain on the tree, going very woody – fascinating. TIME CAPSULE

A day to remember

As the Princess Royal celebrates her 75th birthday, Geoff Hill fondly recalls her visit to Sedgefield in 2012.



The Princess Royal, August 2025

One of the proudest moments of my life occurred in July 2012. That's when I was asked to be the official photographer for the visit of the Princess Royal, who unveiled the new Market Cross, which is in front of St Edmund's Church, on the Crosshill. It had been months in the planning. The first meeting to plan it was in 2008!

MI5 had a list of everyone involved and a meeting was held, in Ceddesfeld Hall, for them to interview everyone. To my amazement, I was not asked to attend so I carried on familiarising myself with Princess Anne's route. I was then approached by John Robinson, who was Mayor at that time. He seemed a bit flustered and said "Geoff, I was talking with the MI5 security, and they said they knew you and didn't need to talk to you! How come?" I was unsure why but, speaking to security later, I learned that I had already been checked by them when I was official photographer for Durham County Council for the opening of Hardwick Park by the Duke of Gloucester, in May 2010.

Then the protection officer gave me his personal advice, about photographing Princess Anne. He said "She doesn't like being photographed, and there have been numerous photographers who have been dismissed in the past. It's best to stay well behind her" as Princess Anne likes to catch photographers off guard, so she will dash forward then stop, to see if the photographer bumps into her. If that happens I would be dismissed OH-OH!



Princess Anne arrived by helicopter, landing at the racecourse and travelled by official car to Ceddesfeld Hall. She was greeted by the Mayor of Sedgefield, John Robinson, and his consort, Maxine. After lunch, Princess Anne was escorted into the village by John, the Mayor, and Lesley Swinbank, Town Clerk. After the unveiling, the princess chatted to those involved in the 700 committee and the school children. As she left in her official car, it stopped. The protection officer jumped out and came over to me. I immediately wondered what I had done wrong but, he said, "Princess Anne would like to thank you very much for doing such a good job. She didn't know you were there!" Princess Anne then waved and smiled at me, WOW!

I later went on to do an exhibition of my photos in the Parish Hall and I was awarded a trophy by Sedgefield Town Council. What wonderful memories I have from that time. Geoff Hill



Cricket

As the 2025 cricket season enters its final month, there is still much to play for at Sedgefield Cricket Club. With the 1st XI almost certainly retaining their place in Division 1, much of the focus has turned to the 2nd XI who, in a very tight Division 3, found themselves in a relegation spot by late July. However, August saw an unbeaten run, including an emphatic win against league leaders Maltby, meaning that by the month end the team had at least put their fate in their own hands by climbing several places up the table. I will report on the season's final outcome next month.

That report will also let you know how the boys' U13 team got on in the endof-season championship play-offs. Sedgefield won their league and, at the time of writing, are preparing to compete with the winners of the two other leagues to secure the overall crown

On an individual front, last month's report mentioned that 17-year-old Ollie Johnson had scored centuries in consecutive games. Print deadlines meant that by the time you read that

Celebrating 120 years of sporting success in Sedgefield

Sedgefield St Edmund's FC at 60

St Edmund's Football Club was founded in 1965 by Alan Hall, at a time when Sunday football was in its infancy. The club started by playing friendlies and then joined the South East Durham League, initially playing home games in Hartlepool. In 1976, the club joined the Durham and District Sunday League, and in 1978 won the President's Cup and its first promotion. St Edmund's has played in only Division 1 and the Premier Division since first climbing the divisions, and has been in the top division continuously since 2001-02, with three Heart Foundation Cup wins along the way. Today's management team of Graham Kime and Martin Lower (both former players) have a great desire to secure more success for the club.

Sedgefield District RUFC at 40

The origins of Sedgefield District RUFC involved a group of student nurses from Winterton Hospital who were missing rugby and came up with a plan to establish a team comprising students and members of the local community. In 1985, the group had borrowed a set of shirts, gained permission to play at the secondary school field, and had established a clubhouse at the hospital's social club. After a nomadic existence for a while, the club established its home at

the cricket club, for which it is eternally grateful. Sedgefield District RUFC hopes to continue growing, so that it can consistently field two teams each Saturday, and stay a vibrant and popular part of the local community.

Sedgefield Harriers at 20

In the September 2005 edition of Sedgefield News, a message from Ean Parsons invited those with an interest to join him for a Sunday morning run. That first run on 7th September was the genesis of Sedgefield Harriers, which was founded later the same month. Only six years after that, the club had almost 200 senior and junior members and was crowned UK Athletics Club of the Year. Despite its development being restricted by not having access to local track and field facilities, the club continues to thrive today, and remains ambitious for the future. Commenting on the 20th anniversary, club chair Sue Dobson notes: "Many of our members also volunteer to support the club, and this is an opportunity to say thank you for that ongoing support."

Athletics

Sedgefield Harriers will host the annual Sedgefield Serpentine Race on Sunday 14 September, beginning at 10am. The 10k trail race will start and finish in Hardwick Park and follow a route on paths to Bishop Middleham and back.

Looking further ahead, the English Cross Country Association (ECCA) has confirmed that the 2026 English National Cross Country Championships will be held in Sedgefield. Organised in partnership with Sedgefield Harriers and supported by Durham County Council, the championships will take place in East Park on Saturday 21 February. The event was last held in the North East in 2013 and will be returning to County Durham for the first time in 25 years. In recent years, East Park has been the venue for both the North **Eastern Counties Cross Country** Championships, in 2015 and 2021, and the Northern Cross Country Championships, in 2024. The much larger scale national event next year will use similar routes around the park, and organisers are working with the local authority and other partners to ensure that adequate infrastructure and logistical support is put in place for the championships.

Sue Dobson, chair of Sedgefield Harriers, comments: "We're delighted that ECCA has decided to bring the English National Cross Country Championships to Sedgefield. Our members know better than anyone that East Park is a great place to run, and we can't wait to welcome fellow athletes from all over the country to find out for themselves. The championships will be a wonderful way to showcase this corner of County Durham to thousands of visitors, and demonstrate that we can put on major events here."






